Ms. Jones stated that she attended the Hampton Roads Transportation Planning Organization (HRTPO) and Planning District Commission meetings. She stated that they have been doing round tables and break-out discussions regarding stormwater issues in the region and that Jamestown 1607 will be part of a case study on how to deal with reoccurring stormwater and flooding issues. She stated that the HRTPO long-range transportation plan was voted on, and she reported that the bridge on Jamestown Road is in the que as part of that plan. She thanked the citizens for all of the emails and their involvement in the budget process.

Mr. Onizuk stated that the Tourism Summit will be held on Friday, March 27 at Busch Gardens. He encouraged citizens to participate in the upcoming budget process. He asked for constructive input and thanked citizens that have already called and emailed.

Mr. Kennedy stated that all of the Supervisors would be holding coming meetings in their respective districts over the next few weeks. He asked for citizens to keep an open mind and to constructively participate. He stated that the Stonehouse District meeting will take place on April 13 at the Library on Croaker Road.

Mr. Hipple stated that he attended the Hampton Roads Transportation Accountability Committee meeting and the WATA meeting as well. He stated that he was the opening speaker for the Garden Club's annual event. He mentioned his appearance on the Weather Channel and an interview with the Associated Press. The Regional Issues Committee (RIC) has been in existence since 1987, and was formed as an outgrowth of the Williamsburg Community Planning Partnership/Williamsburg Regional Commission on Growth process to serve as an advisory body for the three jurisdictions on cross jurisdictional issues.

Over the years, the RIC has served as the coordinating body for several regional initiatives. The coordinated Comprehensive Plan update that took place in 2012-13 serves as the culmination of that regional planning initiative that began almost 30 years ago with the efforts of the Planning Partnership and Growth Commission and was continued by the work of the RIC.

More recently, the RIC has served primarily as an information sharing group as opposed to an action group. Regional cooperation and coordination continues through the efforts of regional bodies such as the Hampton Roads Planning District Commission, Hampton Roads Transportation Planning Organization, and the Historic Triangle Collaborative.

The future of the RIC was discussed by the Committee at its January 27 and April 28, 2015 meetings. Following discussion at the April 28 meeting, the RIC, by a 7-2 vote, recommended to the governing bodies that they approve "A Resolution Discontinuing the Regional Issues Committee."

The City of Williamsburg will consider the proposed resolution at its Council meeting on May 14. York County anticipates that this matter will be on its Board agenda for June 2.

SUBJECT: Discontinuance of the Regional Issues Committee

The Regional Issues Committee (RIC) has been in existence since 1987, and was formed as an outgrowth of the Williamsburg Community Planning Partnership/Williamsburg Regional Commission on Growth process to serve as an advisory body for the three jurisdictions on cross jurisdictional issues.

Over the years, the RIC has served as the coordinating body for several regional projects including the 1993 *Regional Bikeway Plan*; the 1991 *Resource Protection Planning Revisited* study which has served as a basis for historic and archaeological planning; and the 1992 *Natural Areas Inventory of the Lower Peninsula of Virginia*, which has served as a resource for environmental planning.

In 2006 the RIC considered the potential for a coordinated comprehensive plan effort and recommended that the three jurisdictions undertake a simultaneous Comprehensive Plan review at the next cycle. The coordinated update that took place in 2012-13 serves as the culmination of that regional planning initiative that began almost 30 years ago with the efforts of the Planning Partnership and Growth Commission and was continued by the work of the RIC.

More recently, the RIC has served primarily as an information sharing group as opposed to an action group. However, regional cooperation and coordination continues through the efforts of a variety of regional bodies such as the Hampton Roads Planning District Commission, Hampton Roads Transportation Planning Organization, and the Historic Triangle Collaborative.

The future of the RIC was discussed by the Committee at its January 27 and April 28, 2015 meetings. An email survey of the RIC members between these meetings found ten members in favor of the draft resolution discontinuing the RIC; two opposed to the draft resolution; and two expressing concerns with the discontinuance. Following discussion at the April 28 meeting, the RIC, by a 7-2 vote, recommended to the governing bodies that they approve "A Resolution Discontinuing the Regional Issues Committee."

The City of Williamsburg will consider the proposed resolution at its Council meeting on May 14. York County anticipates that this matter will be on its Board agenda for June 2.

Staff recommends approval of the attached resolution.

## A RESOLUTION DISCONTINUING THE REGIONAL ISSUES COMMITTEE

- WHEREAS, the Williamsburg Community Planning Partnership was formed in 1986 out of a concern about the impacts of growth in the region, conducted public sessions involving over 600 local residents, and produced a book of "Idea Group" reports on regional growth issues; and
- WHEREAS, as a result of the Planning Partnership process, the Williamsburg Regional Commission on Growth (Growth Commission) was established in 1987 to consider ways of managing growth and to make recommendations about the best methods to maintain and enhance the quality of life in the community, and consisted of seven residents from each of the three jurisdictions appointed by the governing bodies; and
- WHEREAS, one of the recommendations of the Growth Commission was for the establishment of a Regional Issues Committee (RIC) to serve as an advisory body for the three jurisdictions on cross jurisdictional issues; and
- WHEREAS, the RIC was established in 1987, reviewed and evaluated the recommendations of the Growth Commission, and served as a coordinating body for several important regional studies, which were the 1991 Resource Protection Planning Revised study for historic and archaeological planning, the 1992 Natural Areas Inventory of the Lower Peninsula of Virginia study, and the 1993 Regional Bikeway Plan; and
- WHEREAS, in 2008 the RIC recommended to the three governing bodies that they "undertake simultaneous Comprehensive Plan review," which was supported by resolutions from the governing bodies of James City County, York County, and the City of Williamsburg; and
- WHEREAS, a Coordinated Comprehensive Update was undertaken by the three jurisdictions in 2012-13, and received an award as an "Outstanding Regional Planning Process" from the Virginia Chapter of the American Planning Association in 2014; and
- WHEREAS, the Coordinated Comprehensive Plan update process is the culmination of a regional planning process that began almost 30 years ago in 1986 with the Planning Partnership and the Growth Commission and which was continued by the work of the RIC; and
- WHEREAS, the RIC has fulfilled its purpose of encouraging planning and cooperation on a regional basis; and
- WHEREAS, regional cooperation and coordination continues through the efforts of the Hampton Roads Planning District Commission, the Hampton Roads Transportation Planning Organization, the Hampton Roads Transportation Accountability Commission, the Greater Williamsburg Chamber and Tourism Alliance, and the Historic Triangle Collaborative.
- NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Board of Supervisors of James City County, Virginia, hereby proclaims that the RIC be discontinued effective June 30, 2015, but may be reestablished at a later date by vote of the three jurisdictions, and with issues deemed needing attention being referred to the Historic Triangle Collaborative in the interim.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the members of the RIC be thanked for their service to their individual jurisdictions and to the region.

A quorum was declared.

Mr. Murphy welcomed everyone and called the meeting to order.

## **Meeting Minutes**

The Minutes of the January 27, 2015 meeting were approved.

## **Open Forum**

There were no public comments.

## **Updates / Briefings**

The Committee was provided a link to review the minutes of the Historic Triangle Collaborative.

As Mr. Harris, Senior Vice President, Greater Williamsburg Chamber and Tourism Alliance, stated that the Alliance is receiving encouraging numbers regarding increased visits to the Historic Triangle. Mr. Harris stated that the Alliance will be providing an update on the region at a travel writers symposium in New York City. Mr. Harris noted that the 1 'Hermione, an exact replica of General Lafayette's ship, will be in Yorktown June 5 -7.

## **Future Business**

Mr. Nester stated that at the January meeting, it was recommended to do an email poll of the Committee members regarding the proposal to request that the three jurisdictions discontinue the Regional Issues Committee. Mr. Nester stared that ten members were in favor; two opposed; and two who expressed concerns. Mr. Nester stated that the Committee now has the opportunity to vote on the proposed resolution.

Mr. Collier inquired about the concerns that were expressed.

Mr. Bourn responded that he had been concerned about whether there were additional issues that might need to be addressed by the Committee. Mr. Bourn further stated that after gaining a better perspective on the function of the Historic Triangle Collaborative and the composition of its membership, he believed that it is well suited to addressing any issues that might come forward.

Mr. Bourn moved to recommend that the first resolve in the proposed resolution should be amended to state "...and with issues deemed needing attention being referred to the Historic Triangle Collaborative in the interim."

Ms. Knudson stated that when the Committee was established, there was no other body of a similar nature – especially nothing comparable to the HTC. Ms. Knudson further stated that there were few opportunities for the jurisdictions to talk to each other. Ms. Knudson stated that now there are many high powered committees to discuss common issues. Ms. Knudson further stated that because of this, continuing this Committee is not an efficient use of taxpayer money, nor is it an efficient use of staff time.

Mr. Granger stated that he is opposed to discontinuing the Committee. Mr. Granger stated that he does not know enough about the HTC to be assured that it would be an appropriate replacement. Mr. Granger further stated that it does not appear that the HTC provides a forum for the public to make comment. Mr. Granger stated that he believes there are still issues in the region that would be appropriate for the Committee to address such as establishing a regional identity, tourism issues, housing and economic development.

Ms. Cordasco stated that the membership, mission and purpose of the HTC are not at all similar to the Regional Issues Committee. Ms. Cordasco noted that since this is a local meeting, it is far different than expending resources to travel to other regional meetings. Ms. Cordasco further stated that she does not believe that the request to discontinue should come from the public body; but that the entities that created it should be looking at whether it is being used well. Ms. Cordasco stated that she believes there is still important work for the Committee address.

Ms. Knudson stated that most of the issues such as regional identity, tourism and economic development are being dealt with by the HTC and other entities. Ms. Knudson emphasized that even though the Committee only meets quarterly, it does require the resources of the Planning executives in each locality, which is not inexpensive in terms of money or time. Ms. Knudson further stated that if the governing bodies had work appropriate for the Committee, they would make the assignments; since there are no assignments it is necessary for the Committee to make the request to disband.

Mr. Collier stated that he understands that the HTC has recently decided to separate the three localities from the remainder of the region for economic development.

Ms. Knudson clarified that the HTC has determined to keep and focus the economic development funds for local use among the three localities rather than pooling those funds with the other localities in the region.

Mr. Bourn stated that based on the minutes from the HTC meetings, he is impressed with the depth of coverage for common issues. Mr. Bourn stated that if transparency is a concern, the Committee could make a recommendation that the HTC should consider allowing the press to attend.

Mr. Brazelton inquired how the HTC began.

Mr. Carter stated that the HTC is a formal continuation of the collaboration and cooperation among the three jurisdictions for the 2007 celebration. Mr. Carter further stated that the membership is composed of the chief administrative officer and chair or other representative of the governing body for each locality as well as representation from the Jamestown-Yorktown Foundation, Colonial Williamsburg, the Chamber and Tourism Alliance and Busch Gardens. Mr. Carter further stated that there is generally a public report on HTC activities at each locality's board meeting.

Ms. Knudson stated that the Committee should recommend that the resolution to discontinue the Regional Issues Committee be forwarded to the governing body of each of the three localities.

Mr. Murphy requested that Mr. Bourn restate his amendment to the resolution.

Mr. Bourn stated that the resolution should be amended at the first resolve to read "...and with issues deemed needing attention being referred to the Historic Triangle Collaborative in the interim."

On a roll call vote the Regional Issues Committee voted to recommend to the individual governing bodies that the Regional Issues Committee be suspended or discontinued. (7-2)

## HISTORY OF THE REGIONAL ISSUES COMMITTEE

The Regional Issues Committee has been in existence since 1987, and was formed as an outgrowth of the Williamsburg Community Planning Partnership/Williamsburg Regional Commission on Growth process in 1986 and 1987. The completion of the region's first "Coordinated Comprehensive Plan Update" process in 2012 and 2013, and the consideration being given to carrying on this coordination for future Comprehensive Plans, brings up a need to reevaluate the need for continuing the Regional Issues Committee as an advisory group to the three jurisdictions.

The genesis of our recently completed "Coordinated Comprehensive Plan Update" began in 1986 with the formation of the Williamsburg Community Planning Partnership – a group made up of representatives of the three governing bodies and planning staffs, and representatives of Colonial Williamsburg Foundation, Busch Properties Incorporated and the College of William and Mary. The Planning Partnership was formed out of a concern about the impacts of growth in the region, and involved public sessions involving over 600 local residents. This process resulted in a book of "Idea Group" reports that were used in future deliberations by the Williamsburg Regional Commission on Growth (Growth Commission for short), which was the next step in this regional planning process.

The Growth Commission was established in March, 1987 and consisted of seven residents from each of the three jurisdictions. The Growth Commission evaluated the results of the Planning Partnership Process, distilling 300 pages of Task Group reports into a 20 page summary report with 99 recommendations. This was presented to the three governing bodies. Most of these recommendations have been addressed, some in more detail than others, over the past 30 years. However, the six major growth management goals of the Growth Commission report have been incorporated into the 13 iterations and implementations of our three comprehensive plans in the intervening years.

One of the recommendations of the Growth Commission was for the establishment of a Regional Issues Committee to serve as an advisory body for the three jurisdictions on cross jurisdictional issues. The Regional Issues Committee was established in 1987, and presently consists of 18 members – one member from each of the three governing bodies, one from each of the three Planning Commissions, two citizens from each jurisdiction, and representatives from the College of William and Mary, Colonial Williamsburg, Colonial National Historical Park, Jamestown-Yorktown Foundation, Greater Williamsburg Chamber and Tourism Alliance, and VDOT.

The first task of the Regional Issues Committee was to review and evaluate the recommendations of the Growth Commission. It then served as a coordinating body for several regional studies: the 1993 Regional Bikeway Plan; the 1991 Resource Protection Planning Revisited study which has served as a basis for historic and archaeological planning; and the 1992 Natural Areas Inventory of the Lower Peninsula of Virginia, which has served as a resource for environmental planning efforts.

Although the Growth Commission recommended "a uniform method of data gathering so that all policy makers are using similar figures", it did not specifically recommend joint preparation of three Comprehensive Plans. Over the years, the timing of the three jurisdictions 18 different Comprehensive Plan updates were close, but were never completely coordinated.

The Regional Issues Committee began discussions on a coordinated Comprehensive Plan update in 2006, and recommended to the three governing bodies in 2008 that they undertake a simultaneous Comprehensive Plan review, which was supported by resolutions from the three governing bodies. The coordinated update took place in 2012-2013, and included the following elements: a Joint Transportation Study prepared by the Hampton Roads Transportation Planning Organization; consolidated land use maps; data collection and compilation; and a project web site (www.HTPlanning.org). The public engagement part of the process included a series of four joint public forums to enable the citizens to discuss their views about the area and its future. Following the joint community forums, the three Planning Commissions held a joint work session to review and discuss the citizen comments made at the forums and issues of common concern. After the joint Planning Commission meeting, Williamsburg and York County continued with their Comprehensive Plan update processes, using the public meetings and joint Planning Commission discussion as a component of their public input processes. Following adoption of Williamsburg's Comprehensive Plan in 2013 and York County's in September 2013, the staffs worked to finalize the summary report text and to update the coordinated future land use map to reflect changes that had been made to the designation of various parcels.

The Coordinated Comprehensive Plan update process can be seen as the culmination of a regional planning process that began almost 30 years ago in 1986 with the Planning Partnership and the Growth Commission, and which was continued by the work of the Regional Issues Committee.

In recent years the Regional Issues Committee has served primarily as an information sharing group as opposed to an action group. However, regional cooperation and coordination continues through the efforts of the Hampton Roads Planning District Commission, Hampton Roads Transportation Planning Organization, the Hampton Roads Transportation Accountability Commission, the Greater Williamsburg Chamber and Tourism Alliance and the Historic Triangle Collaborative.

no less than 10%, with a target of 12%, of the total operating budget (General Fund plus the County's share of the Component Unit Schools). Use of the Fiscal Liquidity may be necessary from time to time to meet unexpected revenue shortfalls, a declared fiscal emergency, a financial opportunity to enhance the well-being of James City County or other such global purpose to protect its long-term fiscal security. If the use of Fiscal Liquidity causes the balance to fall below the minimum 10% level, the Board of Supervisors will adopt a plan and

a timeline for replenishing the Fiscal Liquidity reserve to its minimum 10% level.

#### Capital Improvements

Current: To appropriate, at a minimum, 5% of the cost of major capital projects from recurring

revenues.

Proposed: A portion of the annual General Fund cash flow shall be used for one time capital project.

The goal of designating annual cash for capital is 5.0% of General Fund Revenues.

Staff recommends approval of the attached resolution.

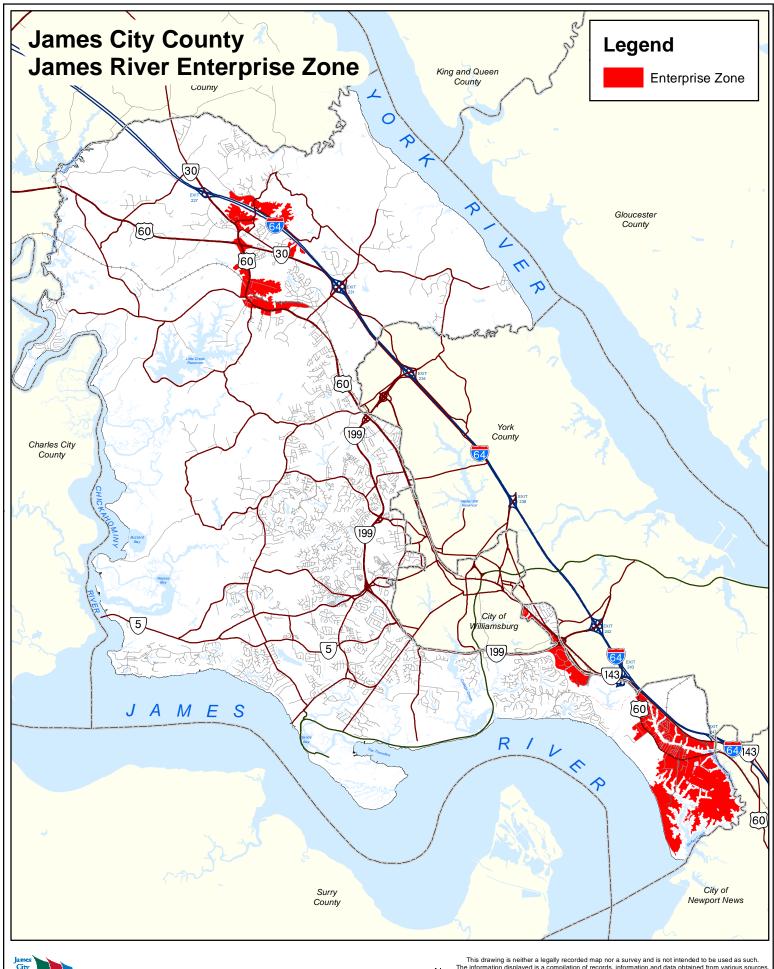

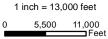

SUBJECT: Sale of Real Property Jamestown Yacht Basin

At its April 14, 2015 meeting, the Board of Supervisors held a public hearing to consider three offers to purchase the Jamestown Yacht Basin. Upon conclusion of the public hearing, the Board deferred decision on this matter until its meeting on May 26, 2015. Since the Board's meeting in April, all three applicants to purchase the property have indicated that their respective offers remain open. None of the three have altered their proposals.

At the April 14 meeting, Mr. Kennedy asked whether the County could obtain any environmental credits by performing remediation work on the property. Staff does not believe that any wetlands credits would be available because the wetlands were encumbered by conservation easements after the property was purchased. If, however, the County installed certain environmental improvements on the property, stormwater credits could be obtained

In 2013, Williamsburg Environmental Group, Inc. prepared a document titled *Integrated Water Quality Improvement Program: Green Infrastructure Assessment for James City County, Virginia* which evaluated certain County facilities, including the Jamestown Yacht Basin, for vegetative retrofits (see Attachment A). These retrofits reduce runoff and utilize vegetative measures to manage runoff, which are generally less expensive to install and maintain than traditional stormwater management measures.

In summary, the report concluded that if the County spent approximately \$219,000 on these retrofits, it would realize approximately nine pounds of pollutant reduction. Similar pollutant reduction projects typically cost between \$270,000 and \$450,000. If the decision was made to change the site from a full service marina to a passive site, the pollution reduction estimates could conceivably double (though the cost to remove the fuel tanks and other infrastructure would increase the per-pound cost).

Should the Board desire to sell the property, I recommend that you adopt the attached resolution.

# 8.6 Jamestown Yacht Basin / Eco Discovery Park

The two (2) parcels totaling 46.24 acres which make up the Jamestown Yacht Basin and Eco Discovery Park are located on Powhatan Creek near the Jamestown Settlement property and the Colonial National Historic Parkway. The site consists of an approximate 670-foot wooden marina bulkhead, a boat launch, marina perimeter boardwalks, covered and uncovered boat slips, a gravel/grass parking area, a separate inlet for commercial watermen, and three (3) buildings housing various businesses. The undeveloped areas of the parcel contain unmanaged vegetation and wetlands. At time of site visit, roughly 300 linear feet of accelerated erosion was noted along the bulkhead which appears in need of major repairs. This parcel was chosen as one (1) of three (3) sites to further develop with concept plans for green infrastructure improvements. Relocation of existing rented boat slip occupants, existing utilities, and impairment of existing businesses during construction are potential conflicts for potential retrofits at the Jamestown Yacht Basin.

Conceptual retrofits for this site include the following practices:

- Bulkhead conversion to living shoreline with floating docks,
- Permeable parking retrofit,
- Vegetated filter strip and bioswale combination along entrance road,
- Rain gardens,
- Rainwater harvesting to supply kayak washwater,
- A "green" fish washing station,
- Green roof,
- Shoreline enhancement with vegetation,
- Wetland enhancements and fringe connectivity improvements, and
- Solar Panels.

Retrofit Potential: Vegetation enhancement and soil amendments in swale as well as witches' hat type filtration at drop box.
