**B. PUBLIC HEARING**

1. United States Postal Service, Postal Facility

United States Postal Service (USPS) representatives held a public hearing regarding a postal facility to be constructed to serve in James City County, Virginia, 23188. Two County citizens spoke, with an invitation extended to other interested citizens to send their comments to the County Administrator for transmittal to USPS.

**C. PUBLIC COMMENT**

1. Mr. Danny Poe, 3016 Camrose Drive, spoke regarding the need for a facility for Colonial In-Line Hockey League organized three years ago by volunteers. He encouraged the Board to favorably support the public/private partnership proposal to be presented at its work session scheduled for Wednesday, April 28.

2. Dr. Linwood Custalow, Mattaponi American Indian Tribe, gave a brief history of the Mattaponi Indians, and extended an invitation for the Board to attend the celebration of the Trail of Hope Walk on Saturday, May 15, 1999, at Jamestown Beach Campground.

3. Mr. Ed Oyer, 139 Indian Circle, suggested the Board return monies to citizens by a decrease in the real estate tax rate.

**RESOLUTION****STREET NAME CHANGE: NEWS ROAD TO OLD NEWS ROAD**

- WHEREAS, Section 19-54 (B) of the James City County Subdivision Ordinance provides for street names to be changed upon approval by the Board of Supervisors; and
- WHEREAS, Revised road configurations in the Ironbound/News Road area have necessitated street name changes; and
- WHEREAS, A resolution passed by the Board of Supervisors on March 23, 1999, named the extension of News Road, connecting News Road and Ironbound Road, "News Road" and
- WHEREAS, The street located behind the Monticello Marketplace is currently named News Road; and
- WHEREAS, There are currently two roads named News Road; and
- WHEREAS, The proposed street name change has been discussed with the Virginia Department of Transportation, Fire Department, Planning Division, and the Williamsburg Post Office, and these agencies have found it acceptable.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Board of Supervisors of James City County, Virginia, does hereby approve renaming the street, News Road, located behind the Monticello Marketplace, to "Old News Road."

## F. PUBLIC HEARINGS

1. Case Nos. ZO-13-98, R-1/Limited Residential District; ZO-14-98, R-2/General Residential District; and ZO-5-98, Residential Cluster Overlay District

Ms. Tamara A. M. Rosario, Senior Planner, stated various alternatives had been developed for calculation of open space, base densities in R-1 and R-2, clusters as a use in R-1, density standards, waivers in buffers, waivers in density standards, and the definition of open space.

Mr. Edwards opened the public hearings.

1. Mr. George Wright, 148 Cooley Road, speaking on behalf of Historic Route 5 Association, spoke in favor of special use permits for by-right developments of two per acre in R-2 and for all cluster developments, and for clusters in appropriate places where likely to support affordable housing.

2. Mr. Richard Costello, 10020 Sycamore Landing, stated that managing growth was different than lowering density. He asked that the public hearing be continued and no action be taken until a later date.

Mr. Edwards continued the public hearings until the May 11, 1999, Board of Supervisors meeting.

Ms. Rosario presented the changes and alternatives for R-1, R-2, and Cluster Ordinances.

Board and staff discussion followed with Board members requesting the following information: 1) determine if nondevelopable area could be located on lots rather than open space; 2) determine impact of recreation facilities on affordable housing and assure facilities are appropriate for all subdivisions; 3) provide alternative language about Best Management Practices located in buffers; 4) consider amendments in preservation of threatened/rare species habitat and specifically define rare; 5) waiver of reduction of buffers for small developments of exclusively affordable housing; 6) accommodation to allow sidewalks on one side of street where appropriate, as community recreation facilities; and 7) reduce open space requirement for affordable housing.

Board members did not request additional information regarding the Streetscape Guidelines Policy and the Zoning Ordinance Transition Resolution.

Without Board objection, Mr. Edwards stated that the cases would be brought back for further discussion at the May 11, 1999, Board of Supervisors meeting.

Mr. Edwards declared a break at 9:40 p.m.

Mr. Edwards reconvened the Board into open session at 9:52 p.m.

**H. BOARD CONSIDERATIONS**

**1. Regional Issues Committee**

Mr. John T. P. Horne, Manager of Development Management, stated that the Regional Issues Committee recommended reorganization of the Committee with bylaws and changes in composition to 16 voting members and three advisory members, who would be staff from the three jurisdictions, James City and York counties, and City of Williamsburg.

Staff recommended approval of the resolution.

Board members expressed support of the reorganization as a good idea.

Mr. Nervitt made a motion to approve the resolution.

**RESOLUTION**

**REORGANIZATION OF THE REGIONAL ISSUES COMMITTEE**

WHEREAS, the Regional Issues Committee was appointed in 1987 to assign responsibility for implementing recommendations of the Williamsburg Regional Commission on Growth, to determine the nature and extent of suggested joint action, and to devise the process through which such coordination can be achieved; and

WHEREAS, it is important to develop a regional perspective on cross-jurisdictional issues and to facilitate communications between James City County, the City of Williamsburg, and York County; and

WHEREAS, the governing bodies and the region would be best served by a reorganized and expanded Regional Issues Committee.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Supervisors of James City County, Virginia, that the membership of the Regional Issues Committee be reorganized in accordance with the "REGIONAL ISSUES COMMITTEE BYLAWS," dated April 1, 1999, expanding the membership to 16 voting members and three staff advisory members.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the purpose of the reorganized Regional Issues Committee shall be to serve as an advisory body to the planning commissions and governing bodies of James City County, the City of Williamsburg and York County, in order to develop a regional perspective on cross-jurisdictional issues and to facilitate communications between James City County, the City of Williamsburg, and York County; and to address the following specific issues: long-range and comprehensive planning for the region; compatible design standards and land use designations along shared boundaries; practices that would establish and maintain sustainable growth while protecting and preserving natural and historic resources and meeting the needs for housing, training, jobs and economic development; and civic beautification, to include recommendations for open space and greenspace preservation.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this reorganization shall become effective July 1, 1999, provided that similar resolutions are adopted by the City of Williamsburg and York County.

Davis, Assistant Manager, Financial and Management Services, stated that a public hearing was held April 13, 1999, on the ordinance amendments to increase fireworks fees from \$50.00 to \$100.00 per event, and establish a waste open-burning permit fee of \$50.00 and a bonfire permit fee of \$25.00 for each event, respectively. She further stated that the outdoor gathering permit fee would be \$50.00 per event.

Staff recommended approval of the ordinance amendments which would implement the FY 2000 budget, effective July 1, 1999.

Mr. McGlennon made a motion to approve the outdoor gathering permit ordinance amendment.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Board of Supervisors of the County of James City, Virginia, that Chapter 9, Fire Prevention, Article I, Fire Prevention Code, is hereby amended and reordained by amending Section 9-3, Amendments.

Chapter 9. Fire Protection

Article I. Fire Prevention Code

**Sec. 9-3. Amendments.**

The fire prevention code is hereby amended, modified and changed as set out in the following subsections of this section.

(3) *Section F-107.2.4.1, Local Fees* is hereby amended:

- (a) ~~\$50.00~~ ~~\$100.00~~ per event or ~~\$100.00~~ ~~\$200.00~~ per calendar year (at same site with similar displays) for fireworks.
- (b) ~~With exception to fireworks permits, no fees are required for Statewide Fire Prevention Code permits issued by the fire department.~~

(b) \$50.00 for each waste open burning permit.

(c) \$25.00 for each bonfire permit.



BE IT ORDAINED by the Board of Supervisors of the County of James City, Virginia, that Chapter 14, Outdoor Gatherings, is hereby amended and reordained by amending Section 14-4, Application for permit.

Chapter 14. Outdoor Gatherings

Sec. 14-4. Application for permit.

(a) Written application for a permit to hold an outdoor gathering shall be made to the county administrator or his designee. The application shall be submitted at least 90 days prior to the date upon which the gathering is to be held. Such application shall be on forms provided by the county and shall have attached thereon plans, documents, approvals and other material required by this chapter.

(b) ~~The fee for each outdoor gathering permit shall be \$50.~~


