### Introduction

In an effort to gather information regarding the opinions of James City County, Virginia citizens regarding County services and initiatives, the Virginia Tech Center for Survey Research (CSR) was contracted by James City County to conduct a citizens telephone survey. The CSR conducted similar surveys in 2001 and 2007 for the County. The series of telephone surveys was designed to measure citizen opinions regarding County services and projects and to assess the initiatives of the County government for use in planning. The overall objective of the survey process is to garner public input that will guide the use of James City County resources and foster continual improvement in the services provided to citizens. Additionally, the results will be used as part of the comprehensive planning process for the County.

For the administration of the 2013-14 James City County Citizens Survey, the CSR conducted a telephone survey of 606 residents of James City County. This report summarizes the data collection procedures and results of the 2013-14 survey. Section 1 provides an overview of the sampling design, survey instrument development and data collection procedures utilized by the CSR for the collection of the data. Section 2 provides a demographic profile of the survey respondents. Section 3 describes citizen ratings of a variety of aspects of James City County. Section 5 discusses survey findings regarding citizen feelings of safety in the County. Section 6 provides the survey findings regarding educational and tourism programs in the County. Section 7 provides an overview of findings regarding the taxes paid by citizens in relation to services and

resource opportunities for the County to consider financing. Section 8 includes an overview of the survey findings related to County communication with citizens. Section 9 provides suggestions from citizens about the County. Section 10 provides information on the data storage for the survey project.

The 2013-14 survey instrument is included in *Appendix A*. *Appendix B* provides tables of response frequencies to all close-ended survey items. *Appendix C* provides responses to the open-ended survey items.

## 1 Methodology

#### **Sampling Design**

A random-digit dialing (RDD) method was employed by the CSR for the administration of the 2013-14 survey. Both listed and unlisted, as well as cellular telephone numbers were included in the sample for this project. CSR worked with Survey Sampling, Inc. of Fairfield, CT, to define the parameters of the sample. The survey sample was randomly generated from numbers available to James City County residents. Because some exchanges border areas outside James City County and because survey respondents sometimes report residing in a neighboring geographic area to the target area, a screener question was also included in the survey. The screener question confirmed James City County residence prior to beginning the survey with a potential respondent. Sample members reporting residence in a locality other than

James City County were eliminated from the eligible sample pool for calling. There were 655 sample members with this final call disposition code.

The 2013-14 survey sample was chosen in an RDD fashion in order to provide a representative, random cross-section of adults residing throughout James City County. Based on a total of 606 completed interviews, the survey has a sampling error of  $\pm 3.9$  percent. Therefore, in 95 out of 100 surveys completed with this number of interviews using the same sampling methodology and parameters, the results obtained would fall in a range of  $\pm 3.9$  percent of the results that would be achieved if interviews were completed with every potential respondent (in households with working telephones) residing in James City County. Smaller sampling errors are present for items on which there is polarized response (e.g. 90 percent identical response on an item).

#### **Survey Instrument Design**

The survey instrument used for this study was developed by the Virginia Tech Center for Survey Research in conjunction with staff members in the James City County Planning Office based on the surveys previously administered for the County. The telephone survey is designed to gather information about the opinions of James City County citizens regarding a variety of County initiatives, services and issues. After the initial telephone survey draft was developed, an instrument pre-test was conducted by the CSR in order to test the position of each survey item within the instrument, the wording of each item and the length of the interview. The survey pretest was conducted with a small sample of randomly selected James City County citizens. After minor modifications to the wording of several survey items, the instrument was tested again with a random sample of James City County citizens and was subsequently deemed to be suitable for data collection. The final version of the survey was approved by the James City County Planning Office for data collection purposes.

The survey instrument includes an initial screening question to ensure that the respondent currently resides in James City County. Interviews were ended after the initial screening question for those respondents who reported that they did not reside in James City County. All survey respondents were asked how many years they have lived in James City County and where they lived before moving to James City County if they moved to the County less than six years ago. Initial survey items include measures of citizen ratings of the quality of a broad variety of community aspects of the County. A variety of items regarding land use and services are also included in the survey instrument. Several survey items regarding County government communication levels and mechanisms are included near the end of the survey. Open-ended survey items were also included in order to allow citizens to provide suggestions for future directions for the County. A number of items related to opportunities for resource expenditures in relation to taxation were also included in the survey as were a number of items capturing demographic information about each respondent.

Attempts to improve survey items for the 2013-14 administration and add items to reflect current issues in the County were made. However, the County wanted to retain some comparability of

data across survey years so many of the survey items were kept the same for this year's survey administration or modified only slightly to allow for that comparability across survey years.

The 2013-14 survey instrument took 16.8 minutes on average to administer. A copy of the survey instrument is located in *Appendix A*.

#### **Data Collection Procedures**

All telephone calls for the survey were made by CSR staff members utilizing a Computer-Assisted Telephone Interviewing (CATI) system at the Blacksburg, Virginia location of the Virginia Tech Center for Survey Research. All calls were made during January-April 2014. CSR wrote a calling program to be used with CATI for administering the James City County Citizens Survey. The program provides scripted survey items, precludes out of range responses and facilitates real-time data entry of all responses gathered on the telephone.

Each interviewer collecting data for the survey project participated in a project-specific training session for the project. All interviewers working on the project have worked on a variety of survey projects and have participated in multiple training sessions in both interviewing techniques and CATI. All interviews were monitored by a CSR Phonebank Supervisor in order to ensure accuracy and proper interviewing protocol.

CSR programmed all call scheduling such that each sample member remaining as a nonrespondent was attempted to be reached at least six times at different times of day on different

days of the week. Calls were made primarily in the evening and weekend hours in order to allow respondents with traditional employment schedules greater opportunity to participate in the survey and to ensure that the survey pool would not disproportionally represent unemployed or retired individuals. A total of 8,187 telephone numbers were attempted during the survey administration. Sample members reporting residence in a locality other than James City County were excluded from the eligible sample pool (N=655); likewise, respondents who indicated a language or hearing barrier such that they could not respond or request that another adult in the household respond, were also excluded from the eligible sample pool (N=116). Non-working telephone numbers (fax tones, out of service/disconnected numbers, automated disconnect services) were also excluded from the eligible sample pool (N=1,371). Non-residential numbers (N=593) were excluded from the eligible pool of sample members as well as households in which it was reported to an interviewer that there were no adult residents (N=16).


After the elimination of all the ineligible records described above, the remaining number of eligible sample members was 5,436. A total of 606 interviews were completed for this study. **Table 1** provides an overview of the final call dispositions for all sample members. Many sample members were never reached after numerous attempts and a final disposition of "no answer" was assigned. Therefore, the residency rate among these households is unknown. It may be assumed that a number of these households are indeed, ineligible sample members due to non-residence. CSR utilizes a standard conversion calling protocol in which all calls that are coded as "soft refusals" are re-attempted utilizing more senior interviewing staff. A call is coded as a "soft refusal" when the potential respondent refuses but does not indicate a reason for exclusion from the calling pool (i.e. refusal due to illness, request to be removed from calling pool, etc.). Likewise, all telephone numbers deemed to be temporarily disconnected are attempted periodically throughout the duration of the study.

### **Respondent Demographic Profile**

Among the 606 citizens responding to the survey, almost six in ten (58%) have lived in James City County more than ten years. This percentage is up from 2007 when 49 percent of James City County residents had lived in the County for more than ten years. Only 3.1 percent of respondents reported residence of less than one year in the County. An open-ended survey item asked those respondents who moved to the County less than six years ago to indicate where they lived before coming to the County. Parallel to the findings in 2007, the majority of the responses to this open-ended item indicate that respondents overwhelmingly relocated from other locations in Virginia. **Figure 1** below provides a visual representation of the number of times each of the localities from which a respondent had moved was reported in the survey. The larger the text in the word cloud the more times the locality was mentioned by a respondent.

The process for creating the word clouds included in this summary included the CSR grouping verbatim open-ended responses from the survey into common themes and then quantifying the themes to be visually represented by the size of the theme in each word cloud. The verbatim responses to all open-ended survey items are also included along with this summary.



More than half (56%) of the respondents to the survey were women and 44 percent were men. Less than one quarter (22%) of respondents reported that they were younger than 46 years of age at the time of the survey, with 40 percent reporting that they were 46 to 65 years of age, and 38 percent reporting that they were older than 65 years of age at the time of the survey.

A substantial majority of respondents (85%) reported that they currently own or are buying their home. Regarding full-time employment for pay outside the home, 49 percent of respondents reported having such full-time employment, with 51 percent of those respondents reporting that this employment is within James City County. 83 percent of respondents who


reported that they are not currently working also reported that they are currently retired. 78 percent of all respondents reported that they are white, with 11 percent reporting that they are black/African American, 6 percent indicating that they are some other race, and 4 percent refusing to report their race. The majority of respondents (84%) indicated having only one to two adults living in their home and the majority of respondents (68%) also reported having no children under the age of 18 living in their home.

Almost one quarter (23%) of survey respondents refused to report their household incomes. Among those respondents reporting incomes, 33 percent reported a household income of at least \$100,000 before taxes last year and 44 percent reported a household income of less than \$60,000 before taxes last year.

### **Citizen Ratings of James City County Community Aspects**


More than 8 in 10 residents of James City County rate the services provided by the County as either 'excellent' or 'good'. This finding is up from 2007 when 77 percent of respondents used these categories to rate the services provided by the County. **Figure 2** depicts the findings for the survey items regarding citizen ratings of selected aspects of James City County.




Parallel to the findings in 2007, the public library received the highest ratings of any other service included on the survey. For the 2013-14 survey, parks and recreational services were split into three survey items. The area of housing opportunities has improved substantially since the 2007 survey. Specifically, this year 54 percent of residents rated this aspect of the County as either 'excellent' or 'good' and in 2007 only 43 percent of residents rated housing opportunities in the County as 'excellent' or 'good'.

### **Citizen Opinions Regarding Land Use Issues**

A wide variety of land use questions were included on the survey. Overall, the land use findings from the survey are highly similar (within 1-2 percentage points) to those found in 2007. However, there is one statistically significant difference in the land use items this year since the 2007 survey. Specifically, far more respondents (68%) agreed in 2007 that it is better to have neighborhoods in which there is a mix of low, middle, and high income housing options than in this year's survey when 61 percent of respondents agreed with that statement. **Figure 3** depicts the survey findings related to the rate of development in the County by type of development.



**Figure 4** depicts the findings from a variety of statements included in the survey related to land use for which respondents were asked to indicate their level of agreement. The figure combines responses of 'strongly agree' and 'somewhat agree'.



**Figure 5** on the following page depicts the frequency of individual responses received on the survey to an open-ended survey item regarding what residents see as the most important land uses and activities that should occur in rural lands in the County over the next twenty years. Many respondents asked in this question that the land be preserved as is and another popular suggestion was to have more farming in the County and more outlets through which the farmers could sell their products such as farmers markets. One An additional survey item asked

respondents how important it is to have places in the County where people can live, work and play in close proximity to which 86 percent answered that it is 'somewhat important' or 'very important'.


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

### **Citizen Perceptions Regarding Safety in the County**


As was the finding in 2007, residents of James City County provided highly favorable ratings of their feelings of safety in the County. Indeed, again this year, nearly all of the survey respondents (99%) said that they feel either 'very' (85%) or 'somewhat' (13%) safe during daylight hours in the County. Feelings of safety in the evening in the County have improved slightly since 2007 (95% feel 'very' or 'somewhat' safe up from 91%). **Figures 6 and 7** depict the findings for the survey items regarding feelings of safety.





### **Findings Related to Education and Tourism**


Ratings of the public school buildings or facilities in the County have gone up since 2007 with 72 percent of respondents rating the public school buildings or facilities as 'excellent' or 'good' this year and 66 percent using the same categories to rate the buildings or facilities in 2007. **Figure 8** depicts the findings related to public school buildings and facilities.



A question regarding the importance of the County creating more career and technical education opportunities for youths that would prepare them for the workforce rather than just for college was also asked of respondents. Almost identical to the findings in 2007, more than nine


in ten respondents (95%) reported that they think the creation of such opportunities is either 'very important' or 'somewhat important'.

Survey respondents were also asked to provide their opinions on the amount of time and resources to supporting tourism in the community. **Figure 9** depicts the findings related to this survey item.




## **Taxes and Opportunities for Resource Use**

Survey respondents were asked to rate the level of services provided by the County in relation to the taxes paid and were also asked if they thought the current level of taxation was too high, about right or not enough. As shown in **Figure 10**, most citizens thought the level of taxation was 'about right', with 72 percent of respondents also indicating that the level of services in relation to the taxes paid was either 'excellent' or 'good'.




**Figure 11** depicts the service level ratings provided by respondents by their responses regarding the current levels of taxation. The majority of respondents who reported that taxes are 'too high' rated services as either 'good' or 'fair', with those rating taxes as 'about right' primarily rating services as 'good' and those rating taxes as 'too low' almost equally using the categories 'excellent', 'good', and 'fair' to describe the current level of services in the County.



The survey included items regarding the importance of using additional fees and taxes to fund a variety of community and recreation opportunities. Respondents were also asked to indicate if they would be willing to pay more in fees and taxes for the service. **Figure 12** depicts the findings for these survey items.


Findings with regard to funding bike and walking trails as well as public access to waterways for swimming and boating were favorable this year as they were in 2007 when very similar percentages of respondents rated these opportunities as 'very important' or 'somewhat important'. Several of the opportunities included in on the 2014 survey were not included on the 2007 survey. Overall, it seems that citizens are more willing to pay extra fees and taxes for opportunities they deem to be more important. However, support for additional taxes and fees was not surprisingly lower than the importance ratings of individual funding opportunities as can be seen in **Figure 12**.

### **County Communication with Citizens**

A number of survey items regarding mechanisms used by the County for communicating with citizens were included in the survey. The level of satisfaction among citizens with the level of communication they receive from the County government regarding services and other community issues is depicted in **Figure 13**.



The communication method from the government that was most popular among the survey respondents was 'an outside newspaper' (59% selected) with 'social media' (17% selected) and 'an outside online news source' (17% selected) being the least popular.

## **Citizen Suggestions for the County**

Survey respondents were asked in an open-ended question what they would most like to see change in the County. As shown in **Figure 14**, many respondents said they would like to see more activities for children, teens, and seniors.

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Survey respondents were also asked what they like best about living in the County. As

depicted in Figure 15, many respondents said that they liked that the County was quiet, safe, rural,

convenient (with regard to distance to more urban localities for example), and has a sense of

history.



## **Data Storage**

An SPSS dataset from which the data in this summary report were derived accompanies this report. All variable and value labels are provided on the SPSS dataset. All electronic files of the survey instrument, report, data, and PowerPoint presentations of the data are the property of James City County. However, the Center for Survey Research will retain copies of all project materials for a period of at least one year. No information from this survey will be shared by the CSR with anyone other than project team members from the James City County Planning Division without the express permission of that office.
