SUBJECT: Presentation on Homelessness in James City County

In James City County, several organizations provide services to individuals and families experiencing homelessness. The presentation will highlight the organizations that assist with providing shelter, such as the Community of Faith Mission (COFM), Williamsburg House of Mercy, United Way of the Virginia Peninsula, 3e Restoration, Inc., The Salvation Army, and Avalon Center. The James City County Housing Unit within Social Services also provides assistance with shelter.

For each organization, information is provided on: 1) Target population served, based on the common definitions of "literally homeless", "at imminent risk of homelessness", "precariously housed", and/or "Households fleeing or attempting to flee domestic violence who are either literally homeless or at imminent risk of homelessness"; 2) structure of the organization; 3) demographics on services provided from 2018-present; and 4) any COVID-related impacts.

Information is also provided on the Point in Time (PIT) Count that is conducted each year by the Greater Virginia Peninsula Homelessness Consortium (GVPHC) of sheltered and unsheltered persons experiencing homelessness. This annual, 24-hour Count provides a "snapshot" of what the level of need is on a certain day. The Count covered the six jurisdictions that comprise the GVPHC: the cities of Hampton, Newport News, Williamsburg, Poquoson, James City County, and York County. There are statistics on the entire region, as well as specific to James City County.

In addition, staff will provide context on the relationship between the County and the community partners and provide information on gaps/needs identified, barriers to meeting those needs, and potential solutions.

Definitions of Homelessness



Social Services

Literally Homeless

Individuals or families who lack a fixed, regular, and adequate nighttime residence, including those residing in a shelter or a place not meant for human habitation, and those exiting an institution where they resided temporarily.

Imminent Risk of Homelessness

Individuals or families who will imminently lose the primary nighttime residence, within 14 days and diversion has been attempted. Also includes households facing eviction.

Fleeing Domestic Violence

Households fleeing or attempting to flee domestic violence (DV) who are either literally homeless or at imminent risk of homelessness.

"Precariously Housed" means that a person does not have a permanent household and is living day-to-day in a motel, in a vehicle, with family or friends, or in some other temporary location.

Paths to Stable Housing

Prevention

Short-term rental assistance and case management for those who are imminent risk

Emergency Shelter

Short-term shelter accommodations, usually in hotel/motels, but also can be in communal arrangements

Rapid Re-Housing

Short-term rental assistance and case management to help transition from emergency shelter to permanent housing



Social Services

Transitional Housing

Supportive, timelimited housing in fixed locations to help bridge from shelter to permanent housing

Permanent Supportive Housing

Housing vouchers for adults with serious mental illness; Collaboration with Colonial Behavioral Health

Housing Choice Vouchers

Rental assistance paid directly to private landlords for qualified very low-income households; Specific vouchers available for Veterans, Elderly, and Disabled

Observations



What's Working Well

- Providers of homeless services (Staff and volunteers)
- Communication and relationships amongst providers
- Supportive services available to address needs (i.e., substance abuse, behavioral health, credit counseling)
- Importance of being traumainformed

Challenges

- Capacity of providers
 - Shelter beds in hotels/motels can be hard to find, are costly and can lead to increased isolation
 - More supportive services needed to address barriers
- Funding
 - Can be restrictive based on source
 - Spending a lot on hotel/motel rooms
 - Would like to focus more on prevention/addressing "precariously housed"

Future Recommendations



- Address capacity limitations of Emergency Shelter options
 - Communal and hotel/motel beds exist currently
 - Single site/fixed location for emergency shelter would need a Zoning review
- Explore more flexible funding options
 - Private funding is less restrictive but contingent upon generous donors
 - Local voucher program could help increase permanent housing options
- Increase affordable housing stock
 - Continue to refine recommendations from Workforce Housing Taskforce





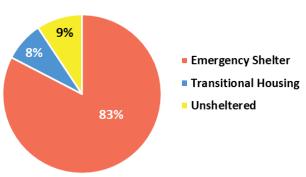
2021 Point in Time Count

What is the Point In Time Count?

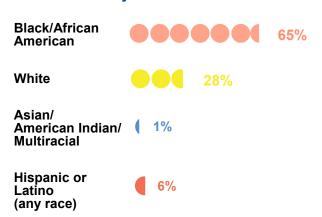
The Greater Virginia Peninsula Homelessness Consortium (GVPHC) conducted a Point in Time Count of sheltered and unsheltered persons experiencing homelessness on January 27-28, 2021. This annual, 24-hour Count provides a "snapshot" of what the level of need is on a certain day. The Count covered the 6 jurisdictions that comprise the GVPHC: Hampton, Newport News, Williamsburg, Poquoson, James City County, and York County. The 2021 Count identified *322* persons experiencing homelessness in the GVPHC region. This is a *24% decrease* from the 2020 Count of 425 persons. This may be attributed to limited capacity at congregate shelters due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

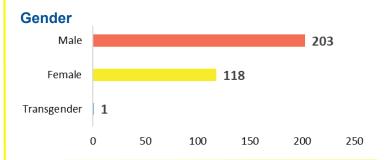

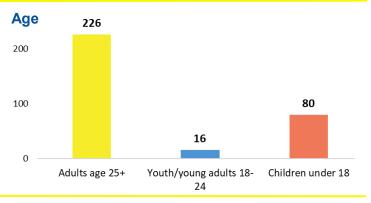
Where people were sleeping



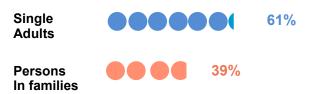

Point In Time Count Trends: 2012-2021

In 2021, the GVPHC saw the lowest Point in Time Count in 9 years, which included persons sheltered and unsheltered. The decreased number identified may be due to the circumstances created by the COVID-19 pandemic which reduced capacity at several shelters.

The number of *veterans* experiencing homelessness in the SVHC service area has steadily decreased since 2015.

The number of *chronically homeless* individuals decreased in 2021, while one chronic homeless family was identified.

The good news is that the pandemic has afforded the community to take advantage of longer shelter stays, and provide longer-term case management, as well as increasing healthcare services to clients in shelters.

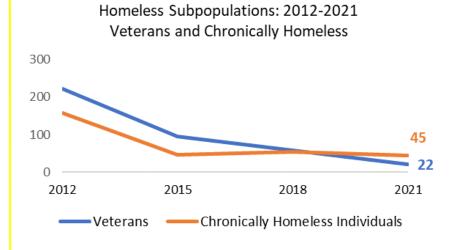
The number of *domestic violence* survivors identified during the PIT Count has steadily decreased since 2015.

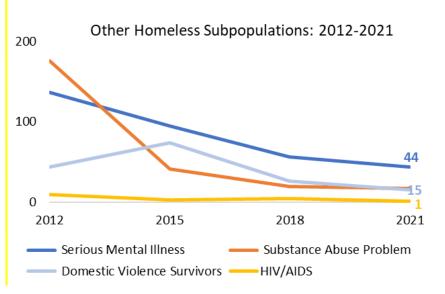
The number of homeless persons reporting a *serious mental illness* has steadily decreased since 2012.

The number of homeless persons reporting a *substance abuse problem* sharply declined in 2015, and has remained fairly level since then.

The number of adults living with *HIV/AIDS* has remained relatively constant, with 1 person counted in 2021.







History and Programs:

Avalon Center had its start in 1978, with community volunteers and the formation of The Task Force for Battered Women. It was incorporated as a nonprofit in 1980. Avalon has a mission to end domestic and sexual violence by breaking the cycle of abuse through education, prevention, shelter and support services in the greater Williamsburg and Middle Peninsula communities. Avalon welcomes diversity and does not discriminate in the provision of services or employment.

Avalon answers a helpline 24 hours a day, 365 days a year. Avalon owns and operates a 5-acre shelter campus in James City County with six 2-bedroom apartments and a 12-15 bed communal shelter to serve single adult women. Men are sheltered at area hotels. The campus includes a playground with picnic area and support buildings. Avalon provides shelter for anyone in our service area who is fleeing domestic or sexual violence, stalking or trafficking. We accept women with children who identify as strictly homeless, as we know that more than 80% of homeless women are survivors of domestic violence or sexual assault and over 60% are recent victims. Survivors are offered basic needs as well as access to van transportation, mental health counseling, case management, legal advocacy, hospital accompaniment, life skills training, and assistance finding a job, access to tutoring, transitional or permanent housing. Avalon shelters between 180-200 individuals every year.

Some survivors will not need shelter and will not face homelessness if we can provide them with direct financial assistance. This may come in the form of paying a utility bill, paying a month of rent or assistance with food, school supplies or other necessities. Counseling, support groups and continued case management services are offered through the Outreach Office and may continue for as long as needed. There are no charges for any services provided. Support services are provided in cooperation with Colonial Behavioral Health, area hospitals and the regional jail.

Avalon also provides many public education and prevention activities throughout the year and direct services for children who are primary or secondary victims. Avalon operates an accredited supervised visitation and exchange center for referrals from the court. We currently have 42 written cooperative agreements with public and private agencies throughout the region including local police with whom we collaborate on a research based protocol for intimate partner violence (Lethality Assessment Protocol).

Structure: Avalon has a volunteer board of directors with membership representing the community. It includes citizens from the localities we serve with expertise in accounting, banking, facilities management, law, domestic violence, criminal justice and medical. Our operating budget in the last 3 years has varied between \$1.4 and \$1.6 million dollars. Over \$100,000 of goods and services are donated to Avalon annually. To fund the programs, we use a mix of federal, state and local government grant support; private and corporate foundation grants, civic, business and religious donations as well as individual donor support. We maintain a \$500,000 line of credit at a community bank and have \$270,000 in reserve.

Avalon has 25 full-time equivalent paid staff and utilizes some 300 community volunteers every year. We leverage local government support as the required cash match to bring nearly a million dollars of state and federal support into the community for our programs. The programs are audited by VDSS and DCJS every three years and Avalon undergoes a single audit every year by PB Mares. Re-accreditation as a domestic violence and sexual assault agency is expected to continue in 2022-2025 through the VA Department of Criminal Justice Services.

In 2021, Avalon was awarded a new grant to provide community-based transitional housing and rental assistance for Middle Peninsula residents and have entered into a partnership with VA Works to apply for an additional \$500,000-\$750,000 over the next 3-5 years to provide transitional housing and rental assistance for survivors in our community.

DCJS Funding – VOCA Funds can <u>only be used for services to benefit victims of crime</u>. \$650,000 for two years (continuous funding). In FY 21 and in FY22, DCJS did not require match funds to help with CoVid-19 relief. Avalon also receives two smaller DCJS grants for \$24,000 and \$16,000 to help fund staffing.

VDSS Funding - Funds <u>Prevention and Services for Survivors of Domestic Violence</u> - \$150,000 annually. Last year, it was increased by \$10,000 to help us handle the CoVid-19 pandemic. We were not required to provide cash match for this grant during fiscal year 21 or 22.

HUD Funding: Specific to residents of the Middle Peninsula who are survivors of DV/SV - \$57,000 – renewed for federal FY22.

USDA – Reimburses Avalon for nutritional meals and snacks provided to children living at the shelter. - \$12-\$15,000 annually.

Office of Violence Against Women – New grant for Transitional Housing (if awarded) is only for survivors of DV/SV.

Local government grants: City of Williamsburg, JCC County, York County, Gloucester, Mathews and Middlesex Counties.

United Way – Avalon is a United Way partner and receives allocations from the Peninsula UW and contributions from Hampton Roads, Richmond, Roanoke and other United Ways.

Community Foundations – Avalon receives grant funding from various community foundations that we apply for every year, including WCF, Richmond Community Foundation, Gloucester Foundation and River Counties Foundation among others.

CoVid-19

Avalon remained open throughout the pandemic, moving counseling and case management services to a compliant online system. The shelter campus remained opened and we continued to answer the helpline 24/7. We moved all the women with children out of the communal shelter and into the apartments. Prior to CoVid-19 these apartments would be rented out based on a portion of income from each resident and they may have stayed a year or more. The communal shelter was eventually closed and single clients were moved to an area hotel. The owner of that hotel gave Avalon a reduced daily rate and we obtained grant funding to cover the cost. We provided all residents with Wi-Fi so that students could keep up with schoolwork as well as offering tutoring by area volunteers. Avalon received enormous amounts of in-kind support early in the pandemic that sustained both the organization and clients.

While the communal shelter was empty, we used that time to install new HVAC units, a whole house generator and new roof for the communal shelter building. All residential units were thoroughly cleaned and new furniture was provided through grants. Communal living with victims of trauma can be challenging and risks re-traumatizing residents. To improve that environment, we reduced the bed

count from 20 to 12 and created a "quiet" room to create a more trauma informed living environment for residents.

During the pandemic, Avalon experienced a 50% increase in calls to the helpline. The severity of the abuse was also increased. Local police noted an increase in domestic violence calls during this time that reflected our experience. Survivors often did not want to enter into a communal shelter setting out of fears of CoVid-19. Requests for counseling and legal advocacy increased substantially. We are currently still accepting between 10-12 new clients for counseling and support every week, placing a heavy burden on our counseling staff, who are surpassing an acceptable caseload. We are currently trying to hire two counselors.

Lessons Learned:

- Clients sheltered in the hotel, resolved their homelessness much quicker.
- Clients with children have responded well to living in the 2-bedroom apartments. Noncommunal shelter is a best practice as it is more trauma-informed and we intend to keep this model going forward.
- Reducing the bed count from 20 to 12 in the communal shelter and added a "quiet room" provides a quieter and calmer environment for residents, which leads to improved outcomes. There are less conflicts and less vicarious trauma for clients but also for staff and volunteers.
- Community-based transitional housing and resources for assisting clients to re-house more quickly is more trauma-informed and allows those families to restart lives.

Info Sheet/FAQ for JCC Board of Supervisors Business Meeting – July 27, 2021

1. Target population?

Community of Faith Mission (COFM) provides emergency shelter during the cold winter months to individuals who are literally homeless.

2. Struction of the organization?

Community of Faith Mission, Inc (COFM) is the only emergency thermal shelter program serving homeless men, women and families in the Greater Williamsburg, Virginia Area. Established in 2012, COFM is a collaboration of more than 30 faith-based congregations, a dozen community partners, and thousands of volunteers offering help and hope to the area's most vulnerable citizens. Governed by a passionate Board of Directors and managed by an Executive Director, three Shelter Managers, and an intern, COFM is a 501(c) (3) organization serving as the bridge between living unsheltered and finding permanent housing. COFM provides three meals a day, 126 nights of safe shelter and other resources to homeless individuals during the coldest months of the year. The shelter rotates weekly to a different host location where guests meet caring volunteers and staff. COFM collaborates with other community service providers and makes regular referrals for medical care, rapid re-housing, and other social services. COFM is frontline help for people who are coming from evictions, off the streets, out of the woods or out of jail.

3. Services provided from 2018 – 2020?

FUNDING

99% of COFM's funding came from a total of five sources:

\$359 Sponsor-a-Night of Shelter Campaign

In FY 2017, COFM launched the impactful \$359 Sponsor-A-Night of Shelter Campaign. It was conceived as a great way for businesses and individuals to help the program by contributing \$359 to cover the cost of one of the 126 nights of shelter provided by COFM. While valuable Host and Shelter Partners open their doors and provide food, \$359 was based on the estimated FY 2016 program operating budget. The Board of Directors ran the campaign from November-March and raised 29% of COFM's total revenue. COFM will continue making the sponsorship campaign an annual event.

Non-profits/congregations

Monetary gifts from non-profit/faith congregations made up 28% of COFM's total revenue. Congregations who serve as Host and Shelter Partners give from their hearts of service, compassion and belief in COFM's mission. Congregations who do not officially participate in COFM show their support for

homeless men, women and families by giving to Williamsburg's thermal emergency winter shelter. COFM is blessed to receive unsolicited funds from congregations, but COFM also proactively seeks grants from those churches with formal application processes. Non-profit organizations see the value of our mission and walk alongside us financially. COFM continues to strengthen their relationship with the community nonprofits and congregations.

Individual & Business Donors

Some of COFM's volunteers bless COFM financially by giving generously to the shelter program. They, along with other individuals, make up the third largest source of income for the organization. Individual donations accounted for 20% of COFM's revenue. COFM makes a concentrated effort to acknowledge and personally thank individual and business donors alike.

Grants—Restricted and Unrestricted

COFM was blessed to receive grants, both restricted and unrestricted. These grants accounted for 18% of the organization's total income. COFM is diligent with the annual reporting on grants to ensure continued invitations to apply for upcoming grant funds.

Warm Up Williamsburg

FY 2021 saw the 8th annual "Warm Up Williamsburg" (WUW) soup fundraiser to support COFM. Delicious soups are donated by local chefs, and proceeds from this January event accounted for 4% of COFM's revenue.

DEMOGRAPHICS

The majority of our guests are single individuals.

In 2018 our 105 guests' make up were:

74% male and 26% female with ages ranging from 5 months to 68 years old.

We had a total of approximately 4 families; 1 with children

In 2019 our 125 guests' make up were:

60% male and 40% female with ages from 2 years old to 78 years old

We had a total of approximately 7 families; 1 with children

In 2020 – with COVID, guests were isolated in hotels in an effort to control COVID during the first 7 weeks of the traditional shelter season through James City County and City of Williamsburg.

For COFM, we had a mixture of congregant shelter and hotel stays. The hotel stays were operated as close to congregant/traditional shelter stays as much as possible. Multiple safety measures were put into place in both congregant and hotel. There were ZERO outbreaks during the COFM shelter season.

Our 47 guests' make up were:

64% male and 36% female with ages from 18 years old to 68 years old

We had a total of 2 families; 0 with children

4. Were there any highlighted COVID related impacts?

During the shelter season and due to COVID, many safety measures were put into place. The prescreening was something that benefitted the COFM shelter program as several other illnesses were detected and addressed.

A large impact was the awareness of how important meeting homeless people where they are and welcoming/conversing with them for longer than an intake process. COFM contracted with 3 different hotels. One of the hotels had a dining area that was provided for COFM's meal time. Several guests made a point to state during the hotel stays at the other 2 non dining hotels that they missed "visiting" and eating with the volunteers and other guests.

James City County's Department of Social Services Housing Unit manages several programs to address the needs of the most vulnerable populations in the Upper Peninsula (James City County, Upper York County, and The City of Williamsburg). The Virginia Homeless Solutions Program (VHSP) provides short-term financial assistance through three projects; Emergency Shelter, Rapid Re-Housing, and Prevention. Services from this program are directed to households who are literally homeless, at imminent risk of homelessness, or precariously housed. The County's Housing Choice Voucher program provides long-term subsidies in the form of vouchers for homeless and disabled veterans through the Veterans Affairs Supportive Housing program and for households who are re-establishing their housing independence after exiting an institution or community housing program through the Mainstream Voucher program. As part of the Peninsula Continuum of Care the Housing Unit is a critical part of the Coordinated Entry System and functions as an Access Point, Assessment Point and Housing Provider. The outreach process begins by meeting homeless households in their current situation to assist with connecting them to resources including wraparound services available through community partnerships with; James City County, Williamsburg and York County Social Services, United Way, Williamsburg House of Mercy, 3e Restoration, Avalon Center, and Community of Faith Mission.

What type of assistance is available through these programs and who is eligible?

VHSP <u>Emergency Shelter</u> provides short-term shelter accommodations to bridge literally homeless households to permanent housing.

VHSP <u>Rapid Re-Housing</u> provides short-term rental assistance and case management to homeless households transitioning to permanent housing. Assistance may include payment of deposit, rent, judgements and other assistance needed to overcome housing-related barriers to ensure access to housing.

VHSP <u>Prevention</u> provides short-term rental assistance and case management to households at imminent risk of becoming homeless. The focus is on preventing evictions when possession has been already been granted to the owner by court action. The household's income cannot be more than 30% of AMI and no other options or resources are available to avoid homelessness.

What is AMI?

AMI stands for Area Median Income. AMI is a HUD established income limit based on area specific Median Family Income estimates and Fair Market Rent. Our jurisdiction's current AMI for a household of 4 at 30% is \$26,200.

How long can a household stay in Emergency Shelter?

The VHSP Emergency Shelter service is intended as a last resort to bridge homeless households into permanent housing. Households entering Emergency Shelter must have the ability to be re-housed within two weeks but extensions may be granted if needed for a total stay of up to 30 days.

What defines a literally homeless situation?

Per HUD's definition (578.3), a person is literally homeless if the household:

- 1. Has a primary nighttime residence that is a public or private place not meant for human habitation; or
- 2. Is living in a publicly or privately operated shelter designated to provide temporary living arrangements (including congregate shelters, transitional housing, and hotels and motels paid for by charitable organizations or by federal, state and local government programs); or
- 3. Is exiting an institution where (s) he has resided for 90 days or less and who resided in an emergency shelter or place not meant for human habitation immediately before entering that institution.

What can I do if I am aware of a homeless person?

Please call the Housing Office's Outreach Stabilization Specialist at 757-259-5346 to report a suspected homeless person's location. Direct contact will be made with the individual or family to conduct an assessment for emergency shelter options, provide resource information and connect them to local resources for wrap around services.



Williamsburg House of Mercy At-A-Glance

Williamsburg House of Mercy has various programs, each designed to meet the needs of a specific population.

- Bridge to Home, The Harbor Day Shelter, Grace Haven Family Shelter, and Mercy Housing are each geared toward the Literally Homeless or those fleeing domestic violence.
 - The Harbor Day Shelter for the Homeless is a point-of-entry for those experiencing homelessness in the upper Peninsula. On-site meals, showers, and job assistance are provided M-F from 10-4. Case managers assess participants on entry and through frequent "touch-backs". The goal of this and all House of Mercy programs is stable, permanent housing.
 - Bridge to Home Shelter Program is a non-congregate shelter model utilizing local
 motel stock to provide safe temporary emergency shelter to Housing Program
 participants while case managers help them to obtain permanent housing. This
 program was developed in October 2020 in response to COVID, and has a current
 capacity of 35-45 individuals. This was made a permanent program for House of
 Mercy the start of the 21-22 FY as we discovered that positive permanent housing
 outcomes increased substantially with this program.
 - Grace Haven Family Shelter is a communal living style home with an 8 bed capacity.
 Program stays are up to a year, and geared toward those who are pregnant and homeless, or have very young children. All participants exit to permanent housing.
 - Mercy Housing is the umbrella for all House of Mercy Housing Programs to include Permanent Supportive Housing, Rapid Rehousing, Housing Trust Fund-Homeless Reduction Grant, and Nests for Neighbors (non-HUD homeless (McKinney-Vento and some Re-entry clients).
- Financial Assistance, Food Distribution, Food Project, Regional Diaper Bank, and Community Soup Kitchen all address various aspects of Homelessness Prevention and Support Services.

Organization Structure:

Williamsburg House of Mercy is a 501(c)3 nonprofit corporation. Day-to-day operations, strategic planning, and budgeting are overseen by a CEO/Executive Director. Williamsburg House of Mercy has a Board of Directors.

Williamsburg House of Mercy currently employs 15 people. Of those, 3 are part time. The Mercy Housing office consists of a Senior Housing Based Case Manager, a Family Services



Housing Based Case Manager, a Re-entry and Outreach Housing Based Case Manager, and a Senior Housing Navigator. Approved but not yet hired: Job Navigator.

• Literally homeless: individuals and families who lack a fixed, regular, and adequate nighttime residence including those residing in a shelter or a place not meant for human habitation and those exiting an institution where they resided temporarily

3e operates an emergency homeless shelter program providing two wellequipped hotel rooms set up as efficiency apartments, paid and available 24/7, 365 days per year. Our Peer Recovery Specialist and Resource Coordinator develop Individual Service Plans while permanent housing options are explored. Stabilization includes access and transportation to mental health and substance abuse services, training/certification & employment specialists. Shelter guests are assisted with budget planning, shopping and food preparation and resource navigation per the individual and family's needs. While this is a short-term shelter program, stays of more than 30-90 days are often needed to navigate disability and supported housing options.

 At imminent risk households: individuals and families who will imminently lose their primary nighttime residence within 14 days and diversion has been attempted

Restoration Place: See description above.

 Households fleeing or attempting to flee domestic violence who are either literally homeless or at imminent risk of homelessness (category one and two above)

Restoration Place only if Avalon is not available. See above description for Restoration Place above

Others, i.e. precariously housed

If state mainstream funding; I.e., Virginia Housing Solutions Program (VHSP) is not appropriate due to program rules & regulations, 3e may elect to use privately funded and/or unrestricted funds to bridge the gap while obtaining services and referrals.

3e uses private funding and partners with the county to shelter additional rooms with the same protocol as above.

• Oversight, i.e. public or private agency, to include private non-profit, faith-based, etc.

3e is a 501 (c) (3) nonprofit faith-based organization who also serves within the CoC, offering programs and services that meet federal, state & local guidelines as a housing provider. Our mission statement is to encourage, equip and empower faith communities to help transition neighbors living through homelessness and social displacement to holistic sufficiency. Our vision is to break the cycle of homelessness and social displacement through gracious hospitality and systemic change one friend at a time.

3e Restoration Place Emergency Shelter is a mass shelter & hotel/motel voucher "hybrid" model, offering onsite intake and assessment for non-congregant hotel rooms. Shelter guests are offered housing stabilization services and resource coordination. This project is an Assessment Point for shelter guests.

3e Restoration Place Emergency Shelter Services is a program that client is sheltered by JCC funding, but 3e does case management and presents them to SCAAN.

3e Restoration @ Home is a privately operated RRH program. Clients are presented at SCAAN and are dually enrolled with JCC RRH program.

3e Restoration @ Home Services is when the client has been housed by JCC RRH funds, but 3e is providing all case management support.

3e Cornerstone is when a client has received a permanent supportive housing voucher and 3e provides all case management support.

3e Case Management supports PSH voucher clients that they have referred to JCC Office of Housing. Other case management clients include individuals and families that require ongoing support services and/or homeless prevention through resource coordination with local partners.

4 full time staff members, along with college interns and trained volunteers. Two additional positions will be added per the recommendations of Spark Mill via our strategic planning being overseen by Virginia Housing Development Authority.

A COVID fund in the amount of \$14,292.06 was established to meet the demand of residents served that were not otherwise covered by mainstream benefits and programs.

For all categories of people mentioned in the email, when they call or come in or email, we refer them to the Housing Crisis Hotline, and if we can determine which jurisdiction, they have been living in/staying, to the appropriate county/city social service office. We do not ask about DV, but if that is mentioned, we refer them to Avalon.

I attempt to return all calls if given a number, and verifying that they know to call the Hotline, checking to see if there are any other ways we might be able to assist.

For precariously housed, we attempt to assist with up to \$300, and refer them to other agencies when more is needed.

Pre-covid we required an eviction, 5-day pay or quit or similar documentation, since covid we ask for their lease and ledger sheet or similar verification from landlord as to amount needed, status. We also ask for ID and current household information.

The Salvation Army is a faith-based non-profit, employing two officers, four fulltime and two part time staff.

We can assist with rent, usually up to \$300 per household per year; unless we have special funding that allows more.

Colonial Williamsburg Foundation funds are for CW employees, and we can assist them up to \$500 per household per year.

The UW Covid funds allowed for \$750 per household, the TSA Headquarters funds allowed for \$500 per household.

All of these three have been used for rent and utilities, the UW and TSA funds were spent by end of December 2020.

United Way of the Virginia Peninsula

Target Population:

United Way of the Virginia Peninsula (UWVP) works alongside nonprofit, government, and corporate organizations to serve those experiencing poverty on the VA Peninsula, with a particular focus on the A.L.I.C.E. (<u>A</u>sset-<u>L</u>imited, <u>I</u>ncome-Constrained, Employed) population.

As it relates to housing and homelessness, our *target population would include those unstably and precariously housed, as well as those at risk of eviction*.

Organizational Structure:

UWVP is a *nonprofit*, charitable organization locally led by a volunteer Board of Directors. UWVP employees approximately *16 total staff people*, *9 of which work in Community Impact*. This work includes our Advocacy & Referral Service as well as the backbone support for the Community Assistance Network (CAN), "a robust network of diverse organizations working together to keep our neighbors housed, healthy, and thriving."

JCC Services, 2018-2021:

- 940 Households served
- 63% of requests were housing-related (motel, new housing, eviction, utilities)
- Over \$270,000 in community assistance provided by community partners and donors

- 987 Households served
- 57% of requests were housing-related

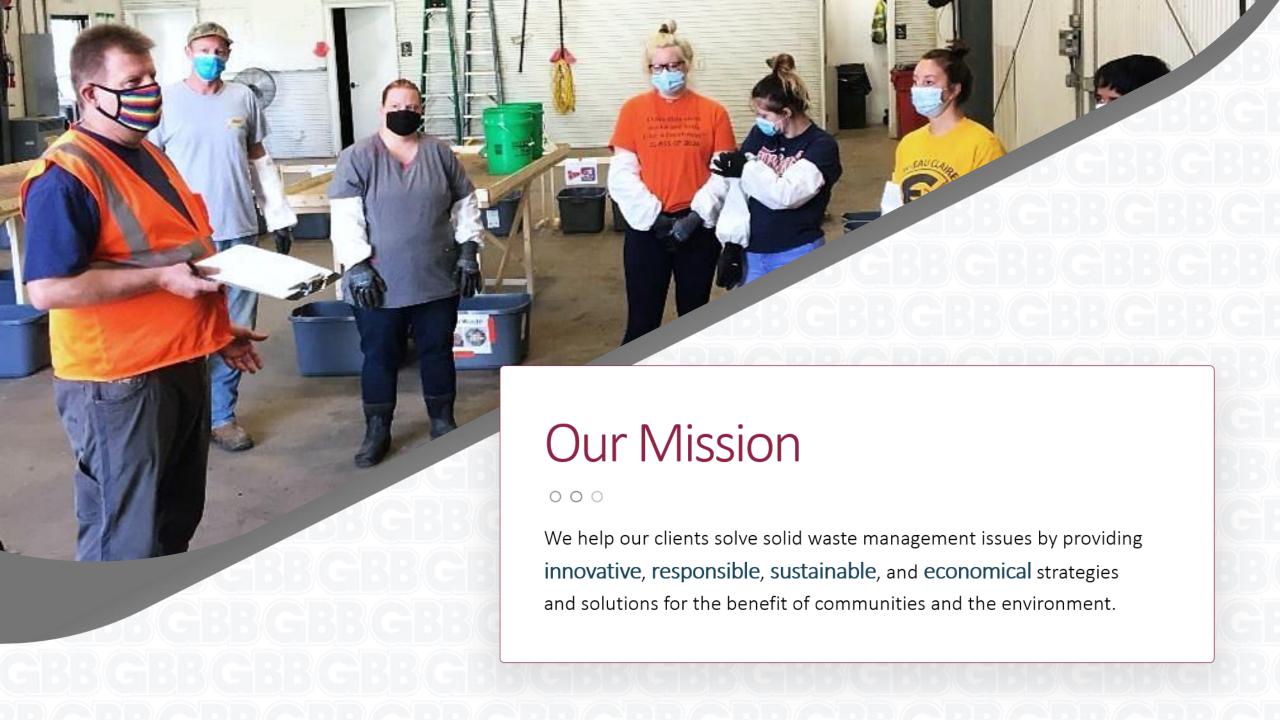

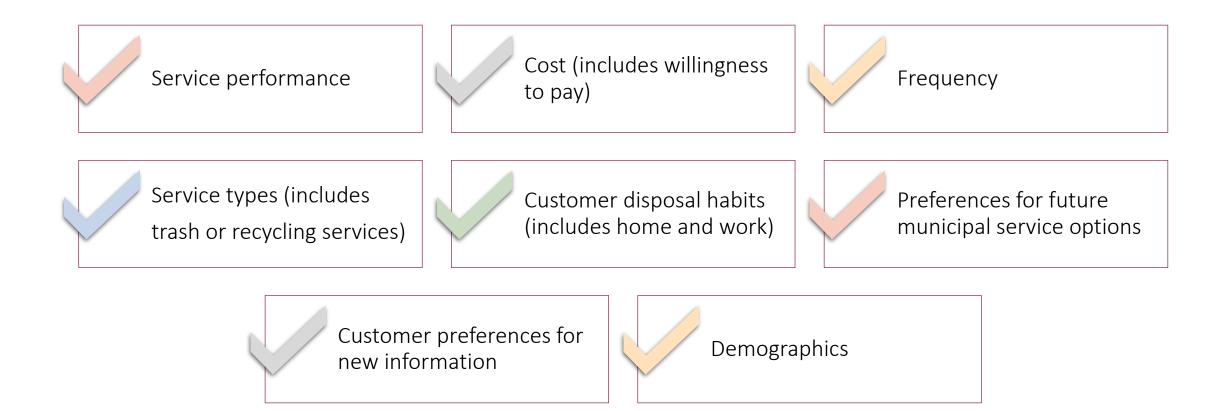

SUBJECT: Colonial Community Corrections Kitchen Construction Appropriation - \$20,000

Colonial Community Corrections (CCC) occupies space within the Court Support Building, which currently does not have a kitchen for staff. Currently even something as simple as washing out a coffee mug has to be done in a bathroom sink. A kitchen would allow for staff to enjoy healthy habits and allow for staff luncheons to take place.

At the end of Fiscal Year (FY) 2020, CCC had a Fund Balance of \$362,295, which is anticipated to increase by approximately \$15,000 for FY2021 based on savings achieved. Staff recommends the utilization of the Fund Balance of \$20,000 for a kitchen build-out in the Court Support Building.

CCC has received an estimate from General Services in the amount of \$18,800 for a vendor to complete the plumbing, electrical, cabinets, flooring, and labor for the build-out of the kitchen. In addition, CCC anticipates approximately \$1,200 is needed for appliances, including a sink, range, and range hood.

The attached resolution authorizes the use of CCC's Fund Balance for this purpose and authorizes the appropriation within the Colonial Community Corrections Fund.

Staff recommends approval of the attached resolution.

The Fiscal Year 2022 Capital Improvements Program budget includes funds for the purchase of a replacement ambulance.

The Fire Department, Fleet, and Purchasing staff examined different options and determined the most efficient procurement method for this purchase is to use a cooperative purchasing contract issued by the Houston-Galveston Area Council (HGAC) to FESCO Emergency Sales as a result of a competitive sealed Invitation to Bid. The HGAC contract contains wording allowing other localities to purchase from the contract.

The HGAC Fire Service Apparatus cooperative contracts offer multiple vendors for rescue and fire apparatus. Base bid items are listed on the specific product pages. Almost all contracts include a wide array of additional configurations, optional equipment, and accessories that are available to allow localities to configure equipment/services to suit their unique requirements. These items were included with the contractor's bid/proposal response and are part of the recommended contract.

Fire Department technical staff researched the design, construction, and field performance of the Horton ambulance, worked closely with FESCO Emergency Sales to design a vehicle that will meet the Department's needs, and negotiated a price of \$303,935 for a replacement ambulance. The cost of the contract is within the funds allotted

Final placement to be determined based on call volume and the condition of other units at the time of delivery. The Fire Department will shift a current ambulance to a reserve status and take the oldest reserve unit out of service. The former ambulance may be sold or used elsewhere in the County in a non-emergency capacity.

Staff recommends adoption of the attached resolution authorizing the contract award to FESCO Emergency Sales in the amount of \$303,935 for the Horton ambulance.

The Fiscal Year 2022 Capital Improvements Program budget includes funds for the purchase of a replacement rescue truck for the Fire Department.

The Fire Department, Fleet, and Purchasing staff examined different options and determined the most efficient procurement method for this purchase is to use a cooperative purchasing contract issued by the Houston-Galveston Area Council (HGAC) to Atlantic Emergency Solutions for the replacement unit. The HGAC contract contains wording allowing other localities to purchase from the contract. By participating in the cooperative procurement action, staff believes the County will increase efficiency, reduce administrative expenses, and benefit from an accelerated delivery process.

The HGAC Fire Service Apparatus cooperative contracts offer multiple vendors for various rescue and fire apparatus. Base bid items are listed on the specific product pages. Almost all contracts include a wide array of additional configurations, optional equipment, and accessories that are available to allow localities to configure equipment/services to suit their unique requirements. These items were included with the contractor's bid/proposal response and are part of the recommended contract.

Working with the vendor, Fire Department technical staff researched the design, construction, and field performance of various models, and ultimately designed a vehicle that will meet the Department's needs. The replacement vehicle will provide increased operational capabilities and safety features. The rescue truck is intended for Fire Station 4. Upon delivery of the replacement unit, the Fire Department will take the old unit out of service. The former unit may be sold or used elsewhere by the County in a non-emergency capacity.

Fire Department and Purchasing staff negotiated a total price of \$937,136 for the replacement unit. Should the County choose to provide a 90% pre-payment of \$843,422, the vendor offers a pre-payment discount of \$32,246, reducing the total contract amount to \$904,890. The cost of the contract is within the funds allotted.

Staff recommends adoption of the attached resolution authorizing the contract award to Atlantic Emergency Solutions in the amount of \$904,890 for replacement rescue.

The Emergency Operations Center roof replacement will consist of the removal of the current ballasted roof and will be replaced with a new EPDM membrane roof. The new roof will have a 2-inch thick base layer of ISO insulation, flashing at walls, walk pads, and new gutters.

An Invitation for Bids was publicly advertised and six qualified bids for the roof replacement were received as listed below.

Preservation Act Support Grant - \$10,000

On June 16, 2021, James City County was offered a grant award from the Virginia Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ) through the Chesapeake Bay Preservation Act (CBPA) Support Program. The funding from this CBPA Implementation Grant will be used to assist low- to moderate-income households with paying for on-site septic tank pump-outs.

The Stormwater and Resource Protection (SRP) Division maintains a database and tracks the number of septic tanks in the County along with the septic tank pump-outs dates provided by property owners. The database identifies which properties are delinquent, in that the County has no record of a septic tank pump-out in more than five years. Letters are sent to the properties owners reminding them of the County Code requirement for pump-out every five years and requesting pump-out notification.

James City County has no program to provide septic tank pump-out financial assistance for those properties where the five-year pump-out has not been completed due to financial concerns by the property owner. Funding through the CBPA Implementation Grant would provide the means for the County to immediately assist in pumping septic tanks within the County exceeding the five-year pump-out requirement, improving water quality in County tributaries and the Chesapeake Bay. The SRP Division will work with the Neighborhood Development Division to develop and implement an income verification process required as part of the grant to identify eligible households.

Staff recommends that the Board of Supervisors adopt the attached resolution to authorize acceptance of these funds and appropriate these funds to the Special Projects/Grants Fund.

SUBJECT: Official Intent to Reimburse Expenditures with Proceeds from a Borrowing

As discussed in the Fiscal Year (FY) 2022-2026 Adopted Capital Budget, the County intends to issue debt to fund certain capital improvements. Projects for FY2022 include an auxiliary gym and emergency shelter at Warhill High School, an expansion of Lafayette High School, improvements at Chickahominy Riverfront Park, and other County and Williamsburg-James City County Schools projects.

The maximum amount of debt expected to be issued for these projects is \$4.8 million, and the County intends to use the proceeds of this borrowing to reimburse eligible expenditures made prior to the issuance of this debt. Eligible expenditures prior to issuance include:

- (1) amounts expended for the cost of issuance;
- (2) amounts (including costs of issuance) not in excess of the lesser of \$100,000 or 5% of the proceeds of the borrowing;
- (3) amounts not in excess of 20% of the issue price of the borrowing which represent preliminary expenditures (such as architectural, engineering, surveying, soil testing, or similar costs) incurred prior to the commencement of construction; or
- (4) capital expenditures (a) occurring not earlier than 60 days before the County adopted a resolution or otherwise declared its intent to issue obligations to finance such expenditures; and (b) are reimbursed no later than the later of (i) 18 months after the original expenditure, or (ii) 18 months after the project is placed in service or abandoned (but in no event more than three years after the original expenditure is paid).

OFFICIAL INTENT TO REIMBURSE EXPENDITURES WITH PROCEEDS

FROM A BORROWING

- WHEREAS, the County (the "Borrower"), intends to design, acquire, construct, and equip various improvements to public facilities, including but not limited to an auxiliary gym and emergency shelter at Warhill High School, an expansion of Lafayette High School, improvements at Chickahominy Riverfront Park, and other County and Williamsburg-James City County Schools projects (the "Projects"); and
- WHEREAS, plans for the Project have advanced and the Borrower expects to advance its own funds to pay expenditures related to the Project (the "Expenditures") prior to incurring indebtedness and to receive reimbursement for such Expenditures from proceeds of taxexempt bonds or taxable debt, or both.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Supervisors of James City County, Virginia:

- 1. The Borrower intends to utilize the proceeds of tax-exempt bonds (the "Bonds") or to incur other debt, in an amount not currently expected to exceed \$4.8 million to pay the costs of the Project.
- 2. The Borrower intends that the proceeds of the Bonds be used to reimburse the Borrower for Expenditures with respect to the Project made on or after the date that is no more than 60 days prior to the date of this Resolution. The Borrower reasonably expects on the date hereof that it will reimburse the Expenditures with the proceeds of the Bonds or other debt.
- 3. Each Expenditure was or will be, unless otherwise approved by bond counsel, either (a) of a type properly chargeable to a capital account under general federal income tax principles (determined in each case as of the date of the Expenditure), (b) a cost of issuance with respect to the Bonds, (c) a nonrecurring item that is not customarily payable from current revenues, or (d) a grant to a party that is not related to or an agent of the Borrower so long as such grant does not impose any obligation or condition (directly or indirectly) to repay any amount to or for the benefit of the Borrower.
- 4. The Borrower intends to make a reimbursement allocation, which is a written allocation by the Borrower that evidences the Borrower's use of proceeds of the Bonds to reimburse an Expenditure, no later than 18 months after the later of the date on which the Expenditure is paid or the Project is placed in service or abandoned, but in no event more than three years after the date on which the Expenditure is paid. The Borrower recognizes that exceptions are available for certain "preliminary expenditures," costs of issuance, certain de minimis amounts, expenditures by "small issuers" (based on the year of issuance and not the year of expenditure) and expenditures for construction of at least five years.

Background

The Virginia Department of Transportation (VDOT) has invited localities to participate in the Fiscal Year (FY) 2023-2024 Transportation Alternatives Program (TA), which helps localities' community-based projects that expand nonmotorized transportation choices and enhancements. The TA program is now a set-aside portion of the federally funded Surface Transportation Block Grant, which was enabled by the passage of the Fixing America's Surface Transportation (FAST) Act in December 2015. The FAST Act identifies four categories of eligibility for this competitive program:

- Transportation Alternatives Comprised of 10 qualifying activities, including historic preservation and rehabilitation of historic transportation facilities;
- Safe Routes to School (SRTS);
- Boulevards in Former Interstate System Routes; and
- Recreational Trails.

The TA program provides federal transportation funds to reimburse up to 80% of costs for qualifying projects, requiring only a 20% match for project costs from local dollars. In recent years, the County has used funding procured through TA grants for projects such as the Norge Depot, SRTS infrastructure at James River Elementary School, sidewalk improvements in Toano, Norge Depot Caboose Restoration, and Clara Byrd Baker Elementary School SRTS Infrastructure. This year, staff is recommending a project for the Board's consideration: Jamestown High School Safe Routes to School Infrastructure Improvements. This project supports Strategic Plan Goal No. 3 to modernize infrastructure, Goal No. 4 to enhance the built environment, and Goal No. 5 for a fiscally efficient government.

Proposed Project

The Jamestown High School Safe Routes to School Infrastructure Improvements proposes various new sidewalks and crosswalks improvement project to connect to nearby neighborhoods. The project begins at the entrance to Fairway Villas along Greensprings Plantation Drive and follow the road south to John Tyler Highway. A new crosswalk would be installed along with the installation of pedestrian buttons, signals and displays, and connect to the existing sidewalk. A second segment would connect from the existing multiuse path for the Greensprings Interpretive Trail and follow Eagle Way north to connect with the existing sidewalk in front of Jamestown High School. This project will include crosswalks at parking lot entrances as well as crossing Eagle Way to connect to Reades Way.

Staff recommends the Board of Supervisors adopt the attached resolution expressing support for this project to be submitted through the upcoming Transportation Alternative funding cycle.

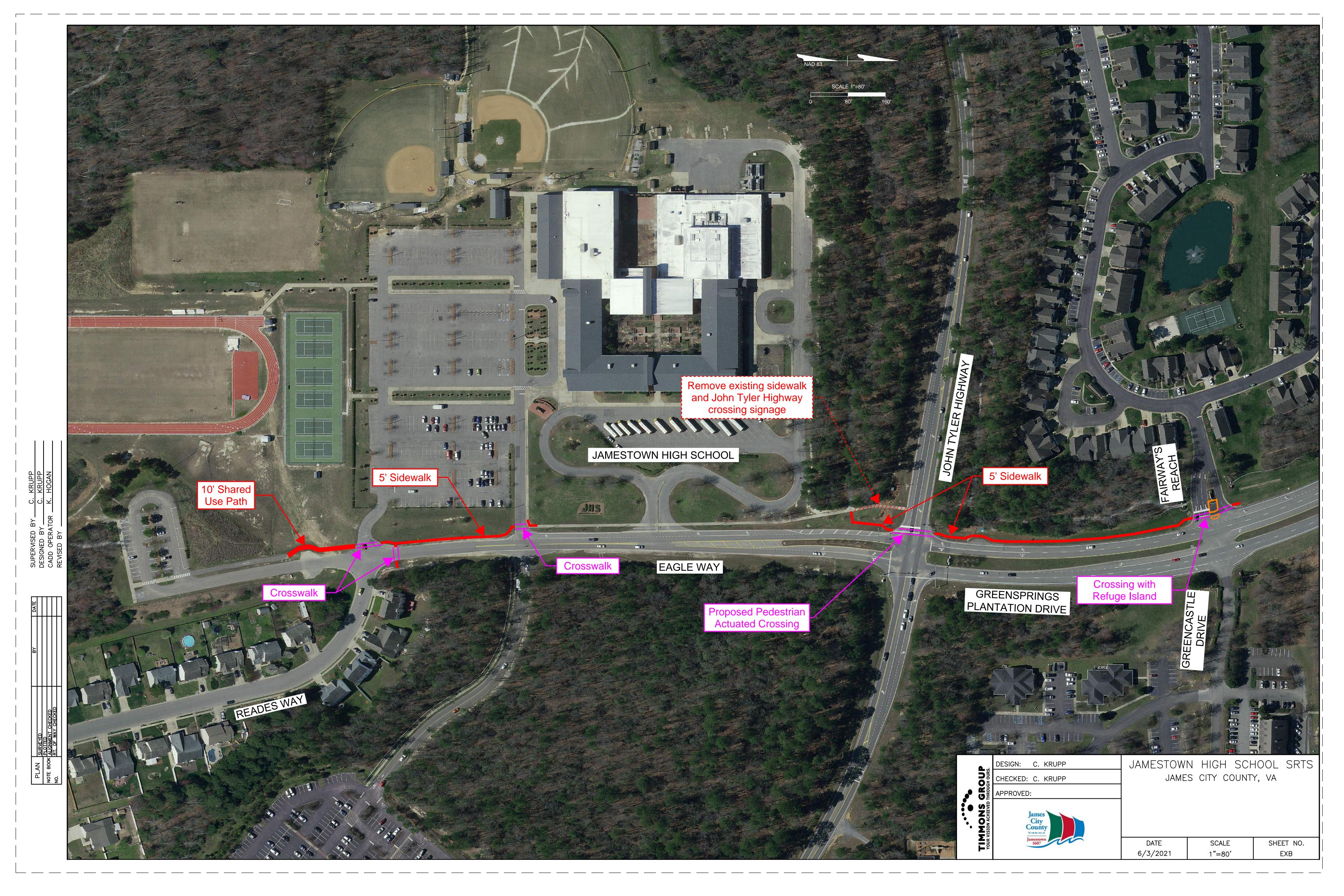

- WHEREAS, in accordance with the Commonwealth Transportation Board construction allocation procedures, it is necessary that a resolution be received from the sponsoring jurisdiction or agency requesting the Virginia Department of Transportation (VDOT) to establish a Transportation Alternatives Set-Aside project to be administered by the locality; and
- WHEREAS, the Board of Supervisors of James City County, Virginia (the "Board") desires to establish a project for improving the safety of transportation infrastructure leading to Jamestown High School; and
- WHEREAS, the Board desires for James City County to submit an application requesting up to \$530,940 of Transportation Alternative Funds through the VDOT Fiscal Years 2023 and 2024 Transportation Alternative Set-Aside program (the "Program"); and
- WHEREAS, sufficient funds exist in the County's Community Development fund for the County to match up to \$132,735 of any funds awarded from the Program; and
- NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Board requests the Commonwealth Transportation Board to establish a Fiscal Years 2023 and 2024 Transportation Alternatives Set-Aside project for the Jamestown High School Safe Routes to School Infrastructure (the "Project").
- BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Board hereby commits to provide a minimum 20% matching contribution for the Project and any additional funds necessary to complete the Project, subject to appropriation.
- BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Board hereby authorizes the County Administrator to enter into a project administration agreement with VDOT for the Project and provide the necessary oversight to ensure that the Project is completed in accordance with all state and federal requirements for design, right-of-way acquisition, and construction of a federally funded transportation project.
- BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Project improvements, once completed, be dedicated to the VDOT system and the County Administrator is authorized and directed to execute those documents necessary to dedicate those improvements to VDOT; however, James City County will be responsible for maintenance and operating costs of the Project until accepted by VDOT.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that if the Board subsequently elects to cancel the Project, James City County will reimburse VDOT for the total amount of costs expended by VDOT through the date of notification of such cancellation. James City County also agrees to repay any funds previously reimbursed by VDOT that are later deemed ineligible by the Federal Highway Administration.

Chafee Education and Training Voucher - COVID-19/Chafee Independent Living - COVID-19 (\$10,884)

The Consolidated Appropriations Act 2021, Public Law (P.L.) 116-260 enacted into law on December 27, 2020, makes continuing appropriations for specified federal agencies and provides temporary flexibilities and assistance in response to the COVID-19 pandemic and public health emergency. Division X of P.L. 116-260, titled the *Supporting Foster Youth and Families through the Pandemic Act*, includes additional funding for the Chafee Education and Training Vouchers (ETV) Program of the John H. Chafee Program for Successful Transition to Adulthood (Chafee Program), which addresses the critical financial needs of youth/young adults who are or were formerly in foster care regardless of current maximum age for foster care under the laws and policies of the Virginia Department of Social Services (VDSS):

- <u>Chafee Education and Training Voucher COVID-19 (\$3,000)</u>: ETV funds are used to cover expenditures associated with post-secondary education (college/university) and vocational training programs.
- <u>Chafee Independent Living COVID-19 (\$7,884)</u>: The Chafee Independent Living Program is a component of VDSS Foster Care and Fostering Futures programs. Services include, but are not limited to, housing education and home management training; budgeting and financial management skills; substance abuse prevention; preventative health activities; and academic support. This helps the participants complement their own efforts to achieve self-sufficiency and to assure that they recognize and accept personal responsibility.

Adult Protective Services - COVID-19 (\$16,159)

The purpose of the Adult Protective Services (APS) - COVID-19 funds is to enhance and improve APS programs' response to the COVID-19 pandemic. Eligible expenditures include purchased services and administrative operations that meet the federal spending guidance. Funding must supplement and not supplant current APS funding provided to localities. This one-time funding is limited and must be expended by September 30, 2022.

• <u>Adult Protective Services - COVID-19</u>: The funds provide for the purchase of goods and services for adults age 60 or older or age 18-59 and incapacitated who are served through the APS program.

Title IV-E Prevention Services (\$63,262)

The 2021 Special Session I Appropriation Act, Chapter 552, included Title IV-E Prevention Services funding for local departments of social services for prevention services through the Family First Prevention Services Act.

• Allocations will provide evidence-based and trauma-informed prevention services to children at imminent risk of entering foster care and their families. The \$63,262 allocation includes a \$40,000 base allocation and a \$23,232 set-aside supplement.

The aforementioned funds received through allocations do not require a local match.

Staff recommends the adoption of the attached resolution to the Social Services Fund.

Federal funding will be available to each locality for Multisystemic Therapy, Functional Family Therapy, and Parent Child Interaction Therapy. The allocations will provide evidence-based and trauma-informed prevention services to children at imminent risk of entering foster care and their families; and
- WHEREAS, James City County is projected to incur expenditures in the amount of \$90,305, which includes \$27,043 for Chafee Education Training, Chafee Independent Living, and APS COVID-19-related purchases as well as \$63,262 for Title IV-E Prevention Services, all of which is to be reimbursed through the Virginia Department of Social Services; and
- WHEREAS, there is no local match requirement for the aforementioned funding.

SUBJECT: The Virginia Department of Transportation Revenue Sharing Program - Fiscal Year 2027-

2028

Each year the Virginia Department of Transportation (VDOT) invites localities to participate in the Revenue Sharing Program, which provides localities an additional funding option to construct, reconstruct, improve, or maintain the highway system. The program matches local dollars on a one-to-one basis up to \$10 million per locality. As a competitive program, VDOT prioritizes eligible projects into the following categories:

Priority 1 Construction Projects that have previously received Revenue Sharing funding as part

of the Program application process.

Priority 2 Construction Projects that meet a transportation need identified in the Statewide

Transportation Plan (VTRANS) or when funding will accelerate advertisement of a

project in a locality's capital improvement plan.

Priority 3 Projects that address deficient pavement resurfacing and bridge rehabilitation.

The County typically uses revenue sharing to provide funding for small projects, immediately needed improvements, or to supplement existing funding on projects. This year staff is recommending one project for Board consideration, the installation of a traffic signal at the intersection of Centerville Road and Jolly Pond Road near Colonial Heritage. As each year of the VDOT Revenue Sharing Program is a different application year, this submission would not impact projects awarded in previous years.

Centerville Road and Jolly Pond Road is an unsignalized intersection. Centerville Road heading eastbound consists of one through lane and a left-turn lane. Centerville Road, westbound, consists of one through lane with a right-turn slip lane to Jolly Pond Road. Jolly Pond Road has a right-turn lane and a left-turn lane onto Centerville Road. The proposed traffic signal, including preliminary engineering, construction, and VDOT oversight costs, is estimated at \$522,187. This application would be considered a "Priority 2" project under VDOT criteria and identified as a safety improvement need in VTRANS.

Staff recommends the adoption of the attached resolution authorizing the County to participate in the Fiscal Year 2027-2028 Revenue Sharing Program.

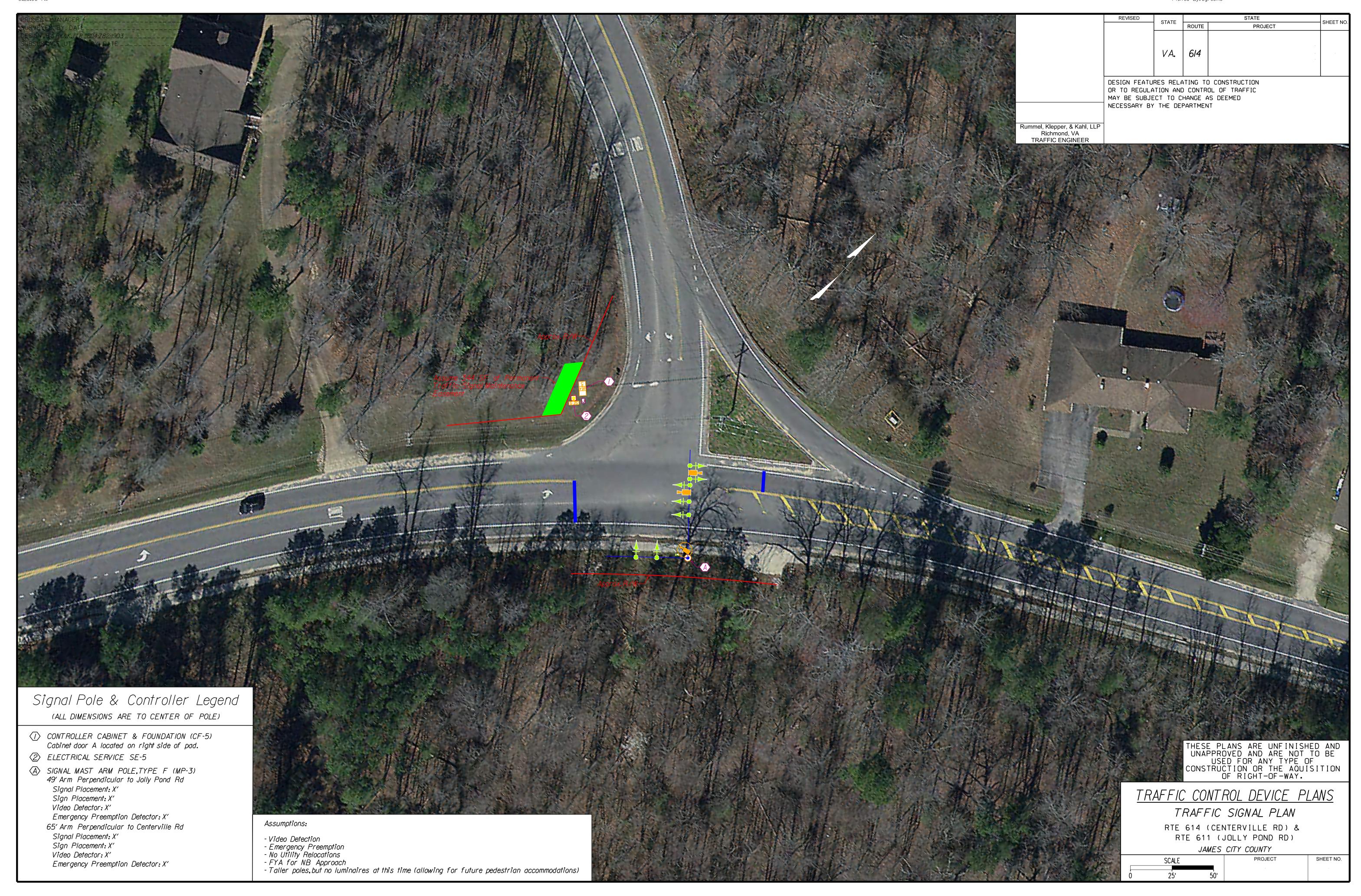

At the July 27, 2021, Board of Supervisors meeting, the Board voted to amend the Fiscal Year (FY) 2022 budget to allow for the use of \$7 million from the Fund Balance for the purchase of the properties located at 4093, 4095, and 4097 Ironbound Road, referred to as the Courthouse Green properties. The County currently leases one of these buildings, which houses Colonial Community Corrections and the Court Services Unit. The County is evaluating its options for the other two buildings, which may include relocation of other County staff/services.

County staff has negotiated a purchase price for these three buildings of \$6.5 million with anticipated closing costs of approximately \$100,000. It is further anticipated the County will need to spend up to \$400,000 to refurbish and ready the building for other County staff/services.

Staff recommends approval of the attached resolution to authorize the amendment to the County FY22 budget and authorize and direct the County Administrator to execute those documents necessary for the purchase of the properties located at 4093, 4095, and 4097 Ironbound Road.

SUBJECT: Virginia United Methodist Homes of Williamsburg, Inc. \$65,000,000 Revenue Bond

Issuance

The Economic Development Authority of James City County, Virginia (the "EDA") has approved the Virginia United Methodist Homes of Williamsburg, Inc.'s ("VUMH") request that the EDA issue up to \$65,000,000 of its revenue bonds to provide funds to refinance previously-issued bonds and to finance other capital projects at the WindsorMeade development. The Internal Revenue Code provides that the Board of Supervisors must approve the issuance of these bonds. Should the Board approve the approval of the issuance of the Bonds, it does not constitute an endorsement to a prospective purchaser of the Bonds of the creditworthiness of the plan of finance or the VUMH. Further, the bonds are not deemed to constitute a debt or a pledge of the faith and credit or taxing power of the EDA or the County.

The County's outside bond counsel, Hunton Andrews Kurth, LLP, has reviewed the request on behalf of the County and the EDA and have indicated no legal issues with the request. They did note one practical concern, however: the primary implication of the EDA's issuance of these bonds means that no bank-qualified bonds can be issued by the EDA or the County in the year that the tax-exempt refunding bonds will be issued (which may be in calendar year 2023). Bank-qualified debt is a special subset of tax-exempt bonds that restricts the aggregate issuance of tax-exempt bonds in a calendar year to no more than \$10 million in return for typically a lower interest rate. Most of the County's recent issuances have been over \$10 million, so bank-qualified debt structure is not often a viable option to the County. As a result, it is unlikely to affect plans for any future County bond issuances.

Supporting materials are attached. Should the Board desire to approve this request, I recommend adoption of the attached Resolution.

RESOLUTION OF THE ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY OF JAMES CITY COUNTY, VIRGINIA, PROVIDING INITIAL APPROVAL OF THE ISSUANCE OF UP TO \$65,000,000 OF REVENUE BONDS FOR THE BENEFIT OF VIRGINIA UNITED METHODIST HOMES OF WILLIAMSBURG, INC.

- A. The Economic Development Authority of James City County, Virginia (the "Authority"), is empowered by the Industrial Development and Revenue Bond Act, Chapter 49, Title 15.2, Code of Virginia of 1950, as amended (the "Act"), to issue its revenue bonds to finance or refinance the construction and equipping of facilities for the residence or care of the aged to protect and promote the health and welfare of the inhabitants of the Commonwealth of Virginia.
- B. The Authority has received a request from Virginia United Methodist Homes of Williamsburg, Inc., a Virginia nonstock corporation (the "Borrower"), to issue its revenue bonds (the "Bonds"), in one or more series at one time or from time to time, to provide funds to make a loan to the Borrower:
- (1) to refinance the Authority's (i) Residential Care Facility Revenue Bonds (Virginia United Methodist Homes of Williamsburg, Inc.), Series 2013A (Senior), (ii) Residential Care Facility Revenue Bonds (Virginia United Methodist Homes of Williamsburg, Inc.), Series 2013A (Subordinate), (iii) Residential Care Facility Revenue Bonds (Virginia United Methodist Homes of Williamsburg, Inc.), Series 2013B (Senior), and (iv) Residential Care Facility Revenue Bonds (Virginia United Methodist Homes of Williamsburg, Inc.), Series 2013C (Senior/Taxable) (collectively, the "2013 Bonds") proceeds of which were used to refinance prior bonds of the Authority that were issued to provide the initial financing for the Borrower's senior living community (the "Community") located in and around 3900 Windsor Hall Drive, James City County, Virginia.
- (2) to refinance the Authority's Residential Care Facility Revenue Bond (Virginia United Methodist Homes of Williamsburg), Series 2016 (the "2016 Bond"), proceeds of which were used to (a) finance costs associated with the renovation and expansion of the health center facility for the Borrower's Community, and (b) to finance costs related to a debt service reserve fund, costs of issuance, working capital, routine capital expenditures of the Community and other expenses in connection with the issuance of the 2016 Bond; and
- (3) to finance other capital projects at the Community all within the existing structures or existing parking facilities located at the Community and amounts required for reserves, working capital, capitalized interest, costs of issuance and other financing expenses related to the issuance of the Bonds. Items (1) through (3) above are collectively referred to as the "Plan of Finance".
- C. Preliminary plans for the Plan of Finance have been described to the Authority and a public hearing has been held as required by Section 147(f) of the Code and Section 15.2-4906 of the Code of Virginia of 1950, as amended;
- D. The Borrower has represented that the estimated cost of undertaking the Plan of Finance will require an issue of Bonds, in one or more series at one time or from time to time, in the aggregate principal amount not to exceed \$65,000,000;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT AUTHORITY OF JAMES CITY COUNTY, VIRGINIA:

- 1. It is hereby found and determined that the Plan of Finance will be in the public interest and will promote the commerce, safety, health, welfare, convenience or prosperity of the Commonwealth of Virginia, James City County, Virginia (the "County"), and their citizens and in particular will promote the providing of health care facilities and other facilities for the residence and care of the aged in accordance with their special needs.
- 2. The Authority hereby agrees to assist the Borrower in undertaking the Plan of Finance by issuing its Bonds, in one or more series at one time or from time to time, in an aggregate principal amount not to exceed \$65,000,000 upon terms and conditions mutually agreeable to the Authority and the Borrower. The Bonds will be issued pursuant to documents satisfactory to the Authority. The Bonds may be issued in one or more series at one time or from time to time.
- 3. It having been represented to the Authority that it is necessary to proceed immediately with the Plan of Finance, and the planning therefor, the Authority agrees that the Borrower may proceed with the Plan of Finance, enter into contracts for land, construction, materials and equipment for the Project, and take such other steps as it may deem appropriate in connection with the Plan of Finance, provided, however, that nothing in this resolution shall be deemed to authorize the Borrower to obligate the Authority without its consent in each instance to the payment of any moneys or the performance of any acts in connection with the Plan of Finance. The Authority agrees that the Borrower may be reimbursed from the proceeds of the Bonds for all expenditures and costs so incurred by it, provided such expenditures and costs are properly reimbursable under the Act and applicable federal laws.
- 4. At the request of the Borrower, the Authority approves McGuireWoods LLP, Richmond, Virginia, as Bond Counsel in connection with the issuance of the Bonds.
- 5. The Bonds shall provide that neither the Commonwealth of Virginia nor any political subdivision thereof, including the Authority and the County, shall be obligated to pay the obligations under the Bonds except from the revenues, receipts and payments pledged thereof, and that neither the faith and credit nor the taxing power of the Commonwealth of Virginia or any political subdivision thereof, including the Authority and the County, is pledged to the payment of such obligations.
- 6. All costs and expenses in connection with the undertaking of the Plan of Finance, including the fees and expenses of Bond Counsel and Authority Counsel, shall be paid by the Borrower or, to the extent permitted by applicable law, from the proceeds of the Bonds. If for any reason such bonds are not issued, it is understood that all such expenses shall be paid by the Borrower and that the Authority shall have no responsibility therefor.
- 7. The Authority recommends that the governing body of the County approve the issuance of the Bonds for the purpose of undertaking the Plan of Finance.
- 8. No Bonds may be issued pursuant to this resolution until such time as the issuance of the Bonds has been approved by the governing body of the County.

- 9. This resolution shall be effective immediately.
- 10. The authorizations granted in this resolution shall continue in full force and effect for a period of three years after adoption, unless specifically extended by the Authority.

WHEREAS, Section 147(f) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended (the "Code"), provides that the governmental unit having jurisdiction over the issuer of private activity bonds and over the area in which any facility financed with the proceeds of private activity bonds is located must approve the issuance of the bonds and Section 15.2-4906 of the Industrial Development and Revenue Bond Act, Chapter 49, Title 15.2, Code of Virginia of 1950, as amended ("Act") sets forth the procedure for such approval;

WHEREAS, the Authority issues its bonds on behalf of James City County, Virginia (the "County"), the facilities to be financed and refinanced with the proceeds of the Bonds are located in the County and the Board of Supervisors of James City County, Virginia (the "Board"), constitutes the highest elected governmental unit of the County;

WHEREAS, the Authority has recommended that the County approve the Plan of Finance and the issuance of the Bonds; and

WHEREAS, a copy of the Authority's resolution providing initial approval of the issuance of the Bonds, a certificate of the public hearing and a Fiscal Impact Statement have been filed with the Board.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF JAMES CITY COUNTY, VIRGINIA:

- 1. The Board approves the issuance of the Bonds, in an aggregate principal amount up to \$65,000,000, by the Authority for the benefit of the Borrower, solely to the extent required by Section 147(f) of the Code and Section 15.2-4906 of the Act, to permit the Authority to assist in accomplishing the Plan of Finance.
- 2. The approval of the issuance of the Bonds does not constitute an endorsement to a prospective purchaser of the Bonds of the creditworthiness of the Plan of Finance or the Borrower. In accordance with Section 15.2-4909 of the Act, the Bonds shall not be deemed to constitute a debt or a pledge of the faith and credit or taxing power of the Commonwealth or any political subdivision thereof, including the Authority and the County.
- 3. The Board has been advised that one or more series of Bonds could be issued under a forward-delivery Bond Purchase and Loan Agreement. Accordingly, the initially issued series of Bonds will bear interest at a taxable rate and at a date in the future, under any forward-delivery Bond Purchase and Loan Agreement the taxable series of Bonds will be refunded by a tax-exempt series of Bonds. The Board has been advised that such subsequent refunding is expected to occur, if at all, in calendar year 2023 and that the principal amount of the subsequent refunding series of Bonds as of the date of such refunding would impact the County's ability to issue "bank-qualified" bonds pursuant to Section 265 of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended, in the calendar year in which such interest rate conversion occurs.
 - 4. This resolution shall take effect immediately upon its adoption.
